Truro Flooded by Salmon River

Cellars Flooded and Streets Blocked by Tremendous Big Ice Cakes.

(Truro Sun.)

The thaw of Friday, Saturday night and Sunday, following so closely on the heels of the severe zero weather brought down an unexpected flood on parts of Truro, greater than has been experienced in years. Early Sunday morning it was noticed that the ice in the Salmon River had broken, and that there was a great jam about one mile above the railway bridge. This broke at noon, with the result that a greater one piled up between the railway and highway bridges, flooding street, yards, fields and cellars in that vicinity. For a time matters looked serious and fears were entertained for the safety of the highway bridge, the ice being piled up nearly to the bottom of the overhanging CELLARS OVERFLOWED.

The cellars of most of the houses between the I. C. R. track and the highway bridge were half full of water, that of the Blawie house near the river, unoccupied, was full, the water reaching to the depth of a foot on the first floor of the building. Shortly after the jam occurred the street way was a mass of water and huge cakes also floating through gardens, over lawns and across fields. This had the effect of suspending travel, especially by means of horse and vehicle, with the result that many residents of Bible Hill were forced to remain a way from church and Sunday School. The flood worked serious damage to the lands of Mr. Angus MacDonald. A fine hog, the property of the gentleman, lost its life in the rush of water. JAM BROKE.

The jam at the highway bridge was tremendous, and for a time there was talk of dynamiting it, but this was not necessary, as about 4 o'clock it gave way before the great weight of ice and water behind it. Shortly afterwards parts of Water Street were submerged, including the grounds of Stanfield's Limited. At this point serious damage was done, the drifting belt being put out of business to such an extent that it was necessary this week to close down the factory till a new one could be secured. Beyond that point the damage was chiefly to fences, bridges and cultivated land. There was also a jam in the Leppier Brook, but it caused little if any damage. The loss is estimated at thousands of dollars, that of Stanfield's Limited alone including injury to plant and loss of time, is estimated at about \$2,500.

THE FARM ICE CROP.

For securing the farm supply of ice a common cross-cut wood saw will answer in place of a regular ice-saw. A marker may be quickly made with a frame of 2 X 6 stuff, and put to work in the usual manner. Start with a piece of old saw instead of rammers on one side. On the other side fasten a piece of smooth iron to run in the last groove to act as a guide. Fasten a wooden handle like a wheelbarrow. Lay the first line with the aid of boards laid on the ice as a guide. The marker should be about two feet wide. Marking both ways will measure off cakes two feet square. Then saw along the lines, following the marks carefully, and cutting the cakes square, so that they will store and pack well. For pushing the cakes about fasten a piece of sharp iron to a long pole. Usually a regular ice pole can be borrowed from some local ice man, like a couple of ice-tongs to help in loading the cakes into the wagon.

When packing into the ice house take special pains to secure good drainage at the bottom, using rails, staves and fill ice and sawdust around the outside, packing tight. Cover the top with two feet of sawdust. Care should be taken to see that there is good circulation of air at the top of the ice house. Almost any house will keep ice if drainage and air circulation are all right.

Sixty tons of ice will be more than enough for any farm, even if there is a great deal of stock and fire storage and some sold to neighbors. A house that will hold this amount of ice can be built for not over \$400, simply putting up framework tight enough to hold sawdust and a roof that will keep out the water.

Market for Woolen Rags.

Mr. J. B. Jackson, in a letter from Leeds, England says: It is better of interest in many trade circles in Canada to know that very large quantities of woolen rags are imported into the heavy wool districts of Yorkshire from abroad to be manufactured into mungo and shoddy. At the present time this industry is experiencing a great activity and consequently the consumption of these rags has increased in proportion. Any firms in Canada in a position to collect supplies would therefore do well to make arrangements to send them forward. At various times when the mungo and shoddy manufacturing trade has been taxed with a heavy demand, much difficulty has been experienced in obtaining supplies either from home or from foreign sources. Instances have been known, in fact where importers have had to resort to advertising for supplies in the French, Russian, and other European newspapers. Almost any line of either new or old woolen rags can be disposed of, no matter what color or description they may be. As to the price they would obtain, however, this is entirely dependent upon the quality of material they may have been cut from in the first instance. A sum of as low as \$90 and \$100 a ton has sometimes been paid at auction, whereas in the case of the very best kind of rags procurable, the price in some very special instances has ranged to well over \$500 for the same weight.
