the standard laid down by Christ, Matt. 10: 37. Read too, Mark 10: 29, 30. On the third day—The distance from Beersheba to Moriah, was about 45 miles. 5. Come again to you—This was not spoken to deceive the men, nor was it the confused utterance of an agitated mind, but he really believed that they would both come back alive. See Heb. 11: 19. 6. Do you see any resemblance here again between Jsaac and Christ 7 Read John 19: 17. 8. Abraham believes that "in some way of other the Lord will prowide?" He is not read? just yet to tell Isaac the whole truth. 9. Bound Isaac his son—He was strong enough to have resisted if he had wished. He must have had faith as strong ds his father's, and must have loved and trusted his father to a wonderful degree. What is required in the fifth commandment? Again point out the resemblance between Isaac and Christ (John 10: 17, 18). 10. The sacritice was virtually offered (Jas. 2: 21; Heb. 11: 17). It is hard to realize what a terrible moment that was for Abraham, yet he did not flinch, although his heart was breaking.

III. FAITH REWARDED. 11. The angel of the Lord—When we read of God appearing after the fall, in some visible form, we are to understand that it was Jesus, before his birth at Bethlehem. It was Jesus who spoke to our first parents; made a covenant with Noah; called Abraham; wrestled with Jacob; spoke to Moses out of the burning bush, &c. (Acts 7: 38). Now I know—God here speaks "after the manner of men." He knew what was in Abraham's heart, but us a judge cannot sentence or acquit a prisoner from his private knowledge of facts, but must go by thd-evidence borought out in court, so God now proved that Abraham was worthy to be the "father of the faithful," and the fountain head of the blessings which were to come through faith. 13. God did provide the "lamb" for the burnt offering. What a happy pair knelt before that altar. The sorrowfhl refrain "so they went both of them together," may now be changed into "so they praised God both" of them together."
