CURRENT TRADE CONDITIONS.

ONTARIO.

Recognizing the fact that prices for lumber cannot go much higher without curtailing the demand, some manufacturers are endeavoring to prevent prices from advancing. If prices should advance much above ruling quotations, it is altogether probable that a sharp reaction would occur, and that the market would be unsettled thereby. It would not be a difficult matter for manufacturers, by concerted effort, to advance prices, as buyers recognize the great scarcity of white pine lumber. There are few water mills on the Georgian Bay that have not sold most of their stock. We have seen letters from wholesale dealers almost pleading for stock and admitting the difficulty of securing sufficient for a cargo. The present is distinctly a millman's market. Retail trade in Toronto, is not picking up, as might be expected. Dealers are filling orders as far as possible from old stock; and are not buying heavily of the new cut,. as it is claimed that prices are too high to leave a fair margin of profit. It may be, however, that they will be compelled to stock up at present prices and to advance retail quotations accordingly. The supply of lath is more plentiful, with prices slightly easier. There is a famine in shingles in Toronto. It is impossible to secure any dry pine slungles at the mills, and it is claimed that the production this year will be unust, 'y light. British Columbia shingles are also out of the market, and dealers who have placed orders with the mills have been advised that it will be impossible to make shipment earlier than from one month to six weeks, on account of the advance orders.

Hemlock lumber is very strong. The retail price in Toronto is about \$14.

QUEBEC AND NEW BRUNSWICK.

Manufacturers are in good spirits owing to the improved outlook for spruce lumber. The shippers have succeeded in placing the bulk of the deals that will be manufactured for the British market. Several spruce cuts which are usually secured by London buyers have this year gone to Liverpool and Manchester. The Joly cut, for instance, has been divided between two London firms and buyers at Manchester. Reports from the New Brunswick drives are not favorable. Water in the St. John river and tributaries has fallen rapidly and several million feet are hung up.

The cedar shingle market is decidedly . strong. The lowest quotations are \$3.50} for extras and \$3 for clears, on Boston, rate of freight. Some manufacturers aresaid to be making sales at \$3.60 and predicting that \$3.70 will be reached at an early date.

MANITOBA AND BRITISH COLUMBIA.

Salesmen report no difficulty in selling lumber throughout Manitoba and the Territories. Retail dealers are stocking up liberally on the belief that the demand will gradually expand as the season advances. Prices of all grades are strong, with finishing lumber leading. The lumber business of British Columbia continues most prosperous, the volume of trade being limited only by the ability of manufacturers to supply the lumber. The saw mill owners of the Boundary district have entered into an agreement to advance the price of lumber to \$14 per thousand, delivered. The activity in the shingle industry is almost unprecedented.

UNITED STATES.

In some quarters there has been a slight falling off in the demand for lumber. Retail dealers are not buying as freely as two weeks ago, probably on account of the decreased building operations in New York and the New England States. Conditions are favorable, however, for a satisfactory summer trade and for the maintenance of lumber prices generally. Wholesale buying has absorbed all the dry stock, and manufacturers have been unable to meet the demand. Heavy rains in the Lake Superior district have relieved the logging situation and assured an ample supply of logs for the mills. Albany sendshigher quotations for uppers, of which the supply has become almost exhausted. Box lumber and mill culls are among the best sellers of the lower grades, at the highest prices that have been reached for years. It is reported from Buffalo and Tonawanda that the proportion of uppers and high grades that are received is growing less each year, which accounts for the fancy prices which are now being paid for these grades. There is a large amount of hardwoods moving and stocks have become somewhat depleted.

In spite of efforts to advance the price of manle, sales are still being made at a low figure. At a meeting of the Maple Flooring Manufacturers' Association held in Chicago recently, prices of clear and common flooring were advanced two dollars and factory grades one dollar. Spruce lumber is strong. In New York city random lengths, 6 and 8-inch, are quoted at \$19 to \$19.50, and spruce lath at \$3.25 to \$3.50.

GREAT BRITAIN.

There is a more cheerful tone to the reports of the British timber market. Buyers are realizing that those who bought early in the season followed the wisest course, as prices are gradually hardening, and those who have not supplied their requirements will be under the necessity of paying higher prices. This applies not only to retail trade, but also to cargo lots. The possibility of securing cheaper lumber later in the year becomes more remote as time goes on. The higher prices appear to be firmly established. Shippers are now asking fo tos c. i. f. London for 3x9 second quality Quebec spruce, and £9 for thirds. It is understood that 1,500 standards of New Brunswick spruce, with 50 per cent. 7 and 8-inch, have been placed at £7 10s c. i. f. London, and that three small cargoes have been sold to the Mersey on the basis of £7 78 6d. At Glasgow white pine deals of all grades are out of first hands, and the first arrivals will doubtless meet a ready market. Birch, elm, ash, oak, and white pine timber have all improved slightly in about the order named.

E. H. Heaps & Company, of Vancouver, B. C., are reported to have purchased a large timber limit at Wharnock.

Stevens & Milton, of Riverside, N. B., are shipping 1,000,000 feet of deals to Cape Tormentine, to load on steamer for export.

The "Manchester City" sailed from Montreal last week for Manchester with a general cargo, consisting principally of deals and grain.

The Collins Inlet Lumber Company have sold their entire pine cut of this season, receiving an advance over last year's prices for every grade.

W. H. McAuliffe, of Ottawa, has purchased the 1902 spruce cut of the St. Anthony Company at Whitney and Mc-Lachelin Bros. at Amprior.

It is estimated that there are 8,000,000 ft. of newlogs in the Douglas boom at Fredericton, N. B., and 12,000,000 feet in the Sugar Island boom. Rafting at the Douglas boom commenced last week.

The steamers / Excalona, Westphalia, Jessie H. Farwell, and Ionia are loading timber cargoes at the Louise Basin, Quebec, the Dunmore Head at Indian Cove and the Aquilla at the Sillery Cove.

The tender of S. G. Parkin has been accepted for supply of lumber for the corporation of Lindsay, Ont., at the following prices: Hemlock plank, \$10 per thousand; pine, \$15; tamarac and cedar,
