Mr. RHODES: This is Friday, and in the ordinary course Mr. Speaker would leave the chair without question put. I take it however that he asks unanimous consent for the purpose of considering the resolution. I move that the house resolve itself into committee of supply.

# Mr. RHODES moved:

Resolved, that towards making good the supply granted to His Majesty on account of certain expenses of the public service for the of \$20,250,290.38 be granted out of the consolidated revenue fund of Canada.

Motion agreed to.

Resolution reported, read the second time, and concurred in. Mr. Rhodes thereupon moved for leave to introduce Bill No. 49, for granting to His Majesty certain sums of money for the public service for the financial year ending the 31st March, 1936.

Motion agreed to, bill read the first and second time, and the house went into committee thereon, Mr. Morand in the chair.

Section 1 agreed to.

On section 2-\$16,058,144.05 granted for 1935-36.

Mr. POULIOT: Mr. Chairman, I should just like to point out how our attitude shows the spirit of conciliation that animates the opposition side of the house. Any member of this house could have spoken several times on the resolution preceding the bill, and then again on the different readings of the bill, and several times again when the bill was in committee, but we are dispensing with all that. So I do not see how members on the other side of the house can afterwards complain that they have received no cooperation from this side of the house.

Mr. CASGRAIN: They will never understand that.

Mr. RHODES: Mr. Chairman, it will be apparent in the first instance that unanimous consent was asked, without which we could not proceed. While I am willing to concede to my hon. friend the truth of the statement he has just made, I might point out that so far as I can recall this has been the practice almost from time immemorial.
