Hon. R. B. HANSON (Leader of the Opposition): Mr. Speaker, I have just a word to add on the main motion. I had not intended making any observations on the third reading of the bill, but quite unexpectedly the amendment asking six months' hoist, which has just now been voted upon, was moved. I believe a word is in order with respect to my position on the vote.

I opposed the principle of the bill on the ground that there was no necessity for a plebiscite. That is over. The government carried the second reading of the bill; it has been carried through committee, now stands for third reading and, after it goes to the other place, is to become law. I accept the will of the majority. Let us get this plebiscite over as quickly as possible and, in the meantime, let us get on with the war effort.

Mr. T. L. CHURCH (Broadview): Mr. Speaker, before the bill is read a third time I want to say that I have opposed the principle of the bill at every stage, and the plebiscite policy to the end. For ten years in this house I have at times stood almost alone in urging immediate rearmament, cooperation and coordination with Great Britain, as I saw this war coming on us. The enemy now is right at our door, in the Pacific. As has been said by the Prime Minister of Great Britain, we have lost command of the sea in the Pacific and our government should manage this war over here itself. I am not going to put party first, but the country, no matter who moves this resolution. I do not think I have ever voted against this party over here since I have been a member of the House of Commons first elected in 1921. But at the present time the matter of life and death for the empire and the defence of the realm is at stake and, as one who has urged for ten years rearmament at a time when it was unfashionable and unpopular to do so, I
