depraved at the time of the Romans that they should be the same today. In that case, Mr. Speaker, we should perhaps go back to the time of the Romans and to their oared boats, which could incite us to set up a Canadian merchant marine. If we were just as logical in all fields!

Mr. Speaker, I would have so many things to say in that connection. In view of such factors as urbanization, industrialization, renewal of our society, problems in large cities, and since there is more and more solidarity among young people, since they want more and more to take their place in this society and seek to reach ideals to carry out their projects, in short, in view of the great willingness shown in Canada, why should we pass legislation which, on the grounds of humanism, is against the human being?

Let us then take the same position we took with regards to alcoholism to promote the self-fulfilment of the human being.

The prime minister himself stated in his speech:

Except if it is necessary to safeguard public order or the security of the human being.

Mr. Speaker, I think that the prime minister was then opening the door to amendments and inviting us to give our views. Let us be logical and get to the basic issues. Many young members have been elected in this house. I had the pleasure to appreciate the work done by the hon. member for Madawaska-Victoria (Mr. Corbin) to whom I want to pay tribute. He said earlier, in reply to the hon. member for Sainte-Marie (Mr. Valade) that he was free. He is free because he is young in spirit and keeps away from beaten paths.

Mr. Speaker, I think it is important to stand together and to follow his example.

Mr. Francis: Mr. Speaker, I rise on a point of order.

The Acting Speaker (Mr. Béchard): Order. The hon. member for Ottawa West (Mr. Francis) rises on a point of order.

That is why, in my opinion, the proposal of the hon, member for Richmond (Mr. Beaudoin) is most worthwhile and should be supported by the greatest possible number of parliamentarians. Let us strike out that provision from the Criminal Code and set up some clinics to look after those sick people.
