Mr. Jamieson: Mr. Speaker, I will be glad to see that the request is passed on to the Canadian National.

MAINLAND CHINA—INQUIRY RESPECTING CANADIAN RECOGNITION

Hon. Martial Asselin (Charlevoix): Mr. Speaker, in the absence of the Secretary of State for External Affairs, I will direct my question to the Prime Minister.

After the start of the negotiations between Communist China and the representatives of Canada, did the Prime Minister receive any indications that an agreement could be worked out soon between Communist China and Canada in connection with the diplomatic recognition of that country by Canada?

Right Hon. P. E. Trudeau (Prime Minister): If the agreement can be arrived at soon—?

Mr. Asselin: —if the talks will soon lead to negotiations on the matter of the recognition of Communist China by Canada?

Mr. Trudeau: Mr. Speaker, I cannot foresee how long it will take, but the talks are going on pretty well.
