HEALTH AND WELFARE

INCLUSION OF OPTOMETRIC SERVICES UNDER MEDICARE

Hon. W. G. Dinsdale (Brandon-Souris): Mr. Speaker, my question is for the Minister of National Health and Welfare. In view of the hardship imposed on Canadians living outside the larger urban centres by the shortage of ophthalmological services, and in light of the consensus on the matter achieved by the provinces participating in medicare, would the minister now assure the House that equal access to eye infraction care will be made available to all Canadians through optometric services being covered by the medicare program?

Hon. John C. Munro (Minister of National Health and Welfare): Mr. Speaker, the hon. member did refer to what we require in terms of a consensus from the provinces. We will be having a meeting shortly, within the next couple of months, with the provincial health ministers at which we will again canvass for a consensus. As the hon. member knows, there have been changes of government in at least two of the provinces fairly recently and if a widespread consensus does occur the government will have to consider extended coverage under medicare.

Mr. Dinsdale: Mr. Speaker, do I take from the minister's remarks that optometric services would be considered provided all provinces participating in medicare achieve a consensus on this point?

REPLACEMENT FOR MV "PATRICK MORRIS"

Mr. James A. McGrath (St. John's East): Mr. Speaker, may I ask the Minister of Transport if he is in a position to report what tangible result his efforts to date have had in alleviating the acute shortage of transportation on the Gulf of St. Lawrence between Newfoundland and Nova Scotia.
