2. 4. (a) How many employees have been provided through the CFLP to Sussex, New Brunswick area farmers since 1974 (b) how many (i) temporary (ii) permanent positions have been filled?

5. How many persons have received training through the CFLP facilities in Sussex since 1974 and in what skills?

6. Is the manager of the CFLP responsible for many duties other than those required under the previous structure?

7. Does the manager of the CFLP have the use of his secretary on an exclusive basis?
