RATE OF UNEMPLOYMENT

Mr. Rod Murphy (Churchill): Mr. Speaker, I have the honour to present a petition now that the House of Commons is sitting. It has been duly certified by the Clerk of Petitions.

In their petition Canadians have expressed concern with the high unemployment rate in Canada expressing the fact that it is one of the highest unemployment rates of the western industrialized nations and, whereas, unemployment continues to be higher than it was for all but two years between 1946 and 1981 and whereas all Canadians should have the right to meaningful employment, the undersigned, your petitioners humbly pray and call upon Parliament to establish full employment as its first priority.

OBSERVANCE OF SABBATH

VIA RAIL SERVICE
