RAILWAYS

Because of his government's economic policies, Montreal faces losing another 250 jobs, this time at CP Rail. More than 1,000 jobs were eliminated in the railway sector since the beginning of this year, in a city where one out of every two adults is out of work.

When will the government start taking poverty in Montreal seriously and implement a genuine recovery plan to provide real jobs for people in Montreal who really need them?
