

In 1761, it was stipulated that the Subjects of *France* should exercise their Cod-Fishery on a Part of the Coasts of *Newfoundland* and in the River *St. Laurence*, according to the Tenor of the 13th Article of the Treaty of *Utrecht*, abstaining from every other Part of the Coasts belonging to *Great-Britain*, whether of the Continent, or of the Islands. The Island of *St. Pierre*, without Fortifications, was to have been ceded to them for the sole Purposes of their own Fishery, subjected to the Residence and Inspection of an *English* Commissary. — The Island of *Miquelon* is now added to that of *St. Pierre*: The most Christian King's royal Word is preferred to the keeping of an *English* Commissary upon the Spot; but the *French* are not permitted to fish within a certain specified Distance of our Coasts.

In 1761, the *French* demanded *Akra* and *Anamaboo* in Exchange for *Gorée* and *Senegal*; or *Senegal* in Exchange for *Gorée*. — Now they have obtained *Gorée*.

In 1761, we consented to treat of an equal Partition of the four neutral Islands; but *France* insisted that *Santa Lucia* should be declared a Part of her Division. — *Santa Lucia* is now restored to *France*, and the other three remain with *Great-Britain*.

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
