RUSSIANS CUTTING OFF ENEMY'S SUPPLY BASE?

Forces Operating South of Libau Believed to Have Achieved Object.

LONDON, June 4.—Russian forces operating south of Libau have cut that city off from Memel, depriving the Germans of their base of supplies, says a Renter despatch from Petrograd. At the same time the Russians took Polangen (on the Baltic in Courland), and the Village of Rutzan south of Libau. Another Russian force is approaching Libau from the north. With this city enveloped the Germans have an outlet only to the sea.

The big loop which the Austro-German forces had made around the Permyel stronghold has been drawn to a straight line. At the same time, to the southeast, Stry has been left behind as Gen. Von Linsingen's forces are pursuing their way northward towards the Diester with Lemberg presumably as their objective, seeking to avoid the great marshes to the west. It is reported that some of these forces already have reached the Diester line near Mikolajow, with Lemberg only about 25 miles away.

LEMBERG'S FALL NEAR BOAST MADE IN VIENNA

Austro-German Forces Are Reported Heading Northward Rapidly.

VIENNA, June 4.—The German and Austrian forces which broke the Russian lines at Stry are moving northward rapidly. The Russians apparently are unable to make a stand in the plains, and the chances of doing so are regarded as problematical.

The Austro-German plan of operations against Lemberg apparently is the same as against Permyel. They are expected to throw columns on both sides of the city and then press together some distance beyond it in the meantime. This movement seems to threaten the Russians fighting around Nadworna with a loss of contact with the main body.

In view of the double success at Permyel and Stry it is expected in Vienna that the Galician campaign will move at an accelerated pace the next few days.

DR. SOPER DR. WHITE

ASQUITH HAS RETURNED FROM VISIT TO FRONT

Premier Was Received Enthusiastically Everywhere by British Troops.

BRITISH HEADQUARTERS IN FRANCE, June 4, via London.—Premier Asquith has just brought to a conclusion a personal visit to the British front, most of which he visited by motor car.

During a tour of four days the premier investigated all phases of the army in the field, hospitals, baths, flying corps, etc. On a certain hill he viewed the trenches and saw shells bursting. Everywhere the British troops received him with enthusiasm.

ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND JEWS ARE HOMELESS

Terrible Conditions Are Reported to Exist in Russian Poland.

LODZ, Russian Poland, June 4.—Warsaw newspapers, which have been smuggling out the lines, say that the number of homeless Jews in the Russian side is increasing steadily. At a conference in Moscow recently of the Jewish Aid Society it was estimated that the number of these homeless persons is about 100,000.
