thirty feet wide, to be widened by the Persons bound to repair them .- Sec. 2.

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Dimensions of Bye Roads.

Bye Roads (Routes) are to be twenty feet wide between two Ditches, each three feet wide, and of sufficient depth to drain off the water and to be made as far as practicable, on the line of division between two Concession or two Proprietors.—Sec. 4.

Dimensions of Roads leading to banal Mills.

Every Road leading to a Banal Mill is not to be less than eighteen, nor more than thirty feet wide between two Ditches each of three feet, where necessary.—Sec. 10.

Highways pasthrough woods how to be made.

On each side of all the King's Highways passing through is a any wood, Trees and Underwood shall be cut down for the space of twenty five feet on each side, by those who are obliged to keep the road in repair, if the Grand Vover or his Deputy shall judge it necessary. The Grand Voyer may lay aside for the use of the Roads, any of the Wood so cut down, and the residue, the proprietors may remove within a year, and if they do not remove it, the Persons obliged to keep the the Road in repair, shall take it away.—Sec. 11.

Ditches dividing farms and rivulets crossing the Highways to be covered with Bridges.

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Ditches dividing farms or concessions, and little rivulets of t crossing the Highways are to be covered with Bridges of Logs of eighteen feet long and be covered with earth, where they are not above four feet wide, if the Grand Voyer or his Depu. upo Public Bridges make by joint Labourers made ty shall direct. Corvees, are likewise to be eighteen feet wide. The Sleeper His must be of Oak, Cedar, Pine, Hemlock or red Spruce, as the hav Grand Voyer or his Deputy shall direct. The flooring of it, v squared logs of the same wood, pinned down to the Sleepers pra with a batten and a rail of three feet high, solidly made of the square Timber on each side. And all Bridges subject to be De raised by the waters, must be loaded with Stones, which are the to be carried and placed by those, who are bound to build and No repair them.—Sec. 16.

Where Ditches are necessary for draining low and marshy Lands, through which the Highways pass the Grand " Voyer may direct them to be made.

Wherever Ditches may be necessary for draining low and is to marshy Lands, through which the King's Highways unavoida it is bly pass, the Grand Voyer or his Deputy, after examination Par is to direct such Persons of the Parish or adjacent Parishe to whom he shall deem the most interested therein of which la y shall draw up his Proces Verbal.—Sec. 12.
