

#### **U. S. AGAIN PROTESTS**

Mexico Held to Account for Injuries to Americans.

WASHINGTON, July 30 .- The Unitel States has again protested to the Mexican Government, and to General Orozco, leader of the revolutionists, against attack upon American citizens and property in northern Mexico. Secretary Knox to-day officially renewed his notice of two months ago, that the United States would hold Mexico to strict account for all damages, and unofficially notified Orozco hat he would be held personally responsible for damages to Americans or their property. President Madero has promised to send more troops to northern Mexico.
