## **NOT AS A FAVOR BUT AS A RIGHT**

Canada Now Has Voice in Determining Issues of Peace and War, Says Rowell.

THE WAR CABINET

Prime Ministers of Dominions Will Communicate Direct With British Premier.

Orono, Aug. 23.-At a well-attended meeting of his constituents here tonight Hon, N. W. Rowell delivered an address, in which he specially referred to the meetings of the imperial war cabinet. He said that at the recent sessions of the imperial war cabinet full and detailed information was laid before the members as to the present mil.tary and diplomatic situation in the various theatres of war in Europe. Asia and Africa, and the overseas members were given every oppor-tunit yto acquire a knowledge concern ng any matters affecting the general war policy or war adminis-tration of the empire, and particularly information concerning operations which their own troops had particinoted or were likely to participate. The questions of the future conduct of the war and the terms upon which we and our allies should be prepared to conclude peace were fully can-vassed. The information thus obtained will prove of the greatest possible value to the overseas members and their governments in determining their own policy in the future. The overseas members of the imperial war cabinet also attended the sitting of the supreme war council at Versailles on July 6, when most important questions relating to the conduct of the war were considered.

"When this war broke out Canada enjoyed complete control over her own domestic affairs, but in all questions of peace and war, issues affecting the ves and welfare of her people Canada had no voice. These matters, so vihad no voice. These matters, so vi-tally affecting Canada's future, were in the hands of the government of Creat Britain as trustees for the whole empire. Every thoughtful student recognized that this condition could not indefinitely continue. All must be agreed that Canada's position and her part in this war entitled her in determining the issues of peace and war and in settling her own

A Difficult Problem. "The difficult problem which faced the statesmen of the empire was how to reconcile autonomy with unity. This problem has been solved, for the present at least, by the institution of the imperial war capinet, and Canada now ed until June of the present year.
