MILLIONS IN CORN

**Are Annually Thrown
Corncob Pipes Made a
Not Cornstalk Paper?**

Rockford, Ill., Oct. 5.—After experimenting and investigation, the expenditure of many thousands of dollars, A. G. Winter, superintendent of the Marston Development, whose main plant is in Illinois, says he has solved the problem of making a commercial and man-made commodity.

Heretofore the shive, or outside of the corncob, has been regarded as useless, but by Mr. Winter's experiment the shive promises to become a valuable part of the stalk from a practical standpoint.

Cramps Are Stockholders

The corncob has been adopted for many purposes, the pith has long been used in the manufacturing of cellulose. The C. W. Cramp Development Company, of Chicago, Ill., are the chief stockholders, the famous shipbuilders of that city. The Cramps are the first to use the front cellulose manufac-
