

## A VERY SANGUINE GENTLEMAN

Howard Foley of Maple Grove Held  
the Weapon That Did

ACCIDENT AT TARGET PRACTICE

Three Doctors From Bowmanville  
Offer No Hope for Recovery—  
G.T.R. Brakeman Crushed.

Newmanville, Jan. 29.—What is likely to prove a fatal gunning accident occurred on the shore of Lake George, Maple Lake, this one and a half miles west of this town yesterday afternoon, when Russell Power, only son of Chester Power, aged about 14 years, was shot in the side by a discharge from a shot gun in the hands of Howard, another school boy.

Foley was on his way home from the High School, and young Power was practising at a target with a new double-barrelled gun he had recently bought. Foley was invited to try a shot, and he fired, but he was aiming towards the target to see how many shots Foley had lodged within the target.

Young Power was a few feet ahead of him, some 20 or 30 feet, and when the other was discharged, the charge entered his hip and penetrated to the lungs. Dr. J. A. Dyer and his clerks were summoned and did all they could for the young lad, but very soon he expired. He was about 15 years of age, and had been at school for a living more than a few hours at most. As peritonitis has set in, the body will have to be buried.

**BRAKEMAN RUN DOWN.**

St. Catharines, Jan. 29.—Frank Miller, a Grand Trunk brakeman, aged 26, and unmarried, met with an accident to day while on his job. He was on the G.T.R. yards at Niagara Falls, Ont., when a train of freight cars was backed down on him, knocking him down several cars passed over his body before he could be rescued. He was brought to this city at half past one this afternoon and taken to the St. Catharines General and Marine Hospital, where his injuries were attended to. The hospital surgeons are as yet unable to state whether the accident was a fatal result. Miller was terribly mutilated.
