Left to Shift for Himself in the Wilds.

SHUNNED BY FOUR STATES

Afflicted Syrian Back to Starting Point After Shuttlecock Journey of Two Weeks.

Cohan Was Nearly where he was informed there was no hospital to accommodate him. The coach in which he rode was cut loose and fumigated.

The whole county board of health met the man when he reached Cumberland. They could do nothing. He attracted such a crowd that the police reserves had to be called out. He made his way down to Brunswick, Md., where the crowd pressed him so closely that he mounted a pile of railroad ties. which looked as If it had been arranged as his funeral pyre. At this point Rossett entered his now famous box car and was hauled down toward Baltimore. The Baltimore and Ohio Railroad did not put him off the train, as their officials thought the best way out of the situation was to assist the man to New York, he hoping to get into a supposed leper colony there. He remained in Baltimore but a few hours. and was then hurried on to Philadelphia. The City of Brotherly Love gave him his first setback by tacking a big Jeprosy sign on the meat car he occupied, and shunting him back to Bal-

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
