

LABOR DELEGATES SUBMIT PROGRAM OF RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE GOVT.

U. S. GOVT. MAKING PREPARATIONS TO FLOAT ITS FIFTH WAR LOAN

LARGE FORCE OF CANADIAN ARTILLERY IS HOLDING LINE AGAINST THE BOLSHEVIKI

Allied Troops Are Blown Back Along the Ice-Filled Streams in the Region of Kadish.

Archangel, Friday, Nov. 22.—By the Associated Press.—In log huts and wind shelters, made of birch boughs, American, Canadian and Allied troops are holding the line against the Bolsheviki on the middle sector of the northern front in the region of Kadish. After ten weeks of fighting in swamps and thick undergrowth, the Allies are now snowed in, and are bivouacked along an ice-filled stream on the opposite side of which the camp fires of the enemy, Sela's, has changed hands twice, and the village of Kadish, which is near where the road crosses the Emta River, 20 miles south of Seletskoe, was captured by the Americans in the fighting. The village is now in the hands of the enemy.

The Bolsheviki at times try the force of their oratorical artillery on the Allies. On two nights during the last week, English-speaking Bolsheviki appeared in No Man's Land, and made speeches urging the Americans not to fight. Great red banners, printed in English, also are strung along the enemy bank of the river. It is understood that a large force of Canadian artillery is engaged on this front.

SELF AGAIN APPEALS TO THE ALLIED POWERS TO MITIGATE CONDITIONS OF ARMISTICE

Requests Permission to Delay the Delivery of Railroad Rolling Stock Until February First.

London, Nov. 27.—Dr. W. S. Self, the German foreign minister, has asked the Allies once more for a mitigation of the armistice conditions, and has requested permission to delay the delivery of railroad rolling stock under the terms of the agreement between Germany and the Allies. On February 1, on the basis of difficulties caused by bad conditions and the lack of lubricating oils.

VON DER MARWITZ WITH A BIG ARMY PREPARING FOR A COUNTER-MOVE

Revolution May Be Started by Former Aide-de-Camp of ex-Kaiser.

Amsterdam, Nov. 26.—Gen. von der Marwitz, former aide de camp to Emperor William, and later commander of German forces on the Western front, has arrived at Brussels with a big army and appears to be preparing for a counter-revolution, according to a sensational dispatch from Berlin, filed there on November 21.

DR. W. S. SELF MAY RESIGN HIS POSITION

Action Expected to Follow Developments at Federal Conference.

Paris, Nov. 27.—Dr. W. S. Self, the German foreign minister, may resign very soon. It is indicated by developments during debates at the conference at Berlin, according to Berlin dispatches to the Petit Parisien.

CANADA MUST SPEND HUNDRED MILLION MORE THAN IN 1914

Sir Thomas White Corrects Statement Claimed Made to Prov. Premiers.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Ottawa, Nov. 27.—Sir Thomas White, minister of finance, declares this morning that the statement made to provincial premiers to the effect that additional revenue to the amount of \$100,000,000 would have to be raised by the Federal Government through taxation during the coming year is without foundation. The minister said that compared with 1914, the year before the war, the expenditures of the Dominion during coming year on account of added interest on the national debt and on account of pensions would be a hundred million higher. Meantime during each year since the war there had been added tax, with the result that this year the total revenue will reach \$300,000,000 as compared with about half that amount for 1914.

BRANTFORD AVIATOR RECOMMENDED FOR THE FLYING CROSS

Lieut. Stanley Buck Did Effective Work in Cambrai Drive.

Brantford, Nov. 27.—Lieut. Stanley Buck, R. C. F. C., of this city, has been recommended for the Royal Flying Cross for daring work in low flying and attacking infantry units in the drive for Cambrai. His work in assisting the infantry was particularly effective.

MUNICIPALITY MAY PROVIDE FUND FOR ERECTING HOUSES

Probable That Citizens Will Be Asked to Vote It.

London citizens will in all probability be called upon to vote on a bylaw to authorize the issuing of debentures to provide money to lend for the purpose of building houses. A special committee was appointed by the city council last night to inquire into the housing situation in the city. The committee will also be asked to co-operate with the committee in the preliminary investigation. It is pointed out that the need of medium-sized houses in the city is great at the present time. With the return of the soldiers this will be increased.

COMMITTED FOR TRIAL ON CHARGE OF MURDER

Frank McCullough Receives Preliminary Hearing in Toronto Court.

Toronto, Nov. 27.—Frank McCullough was committed for trial by the magistrate in the police court this morning on the charge of murdering Detective Williamson on November 19. Detective Cronin testified that the prisoner after his arrest said: "I shot him, I'm prepared to meet the consequences. I'll be a man. No tears will go to the gallows with me."

RUMANIAN TRANSYLVANIA PROCLAIMS INDEPENDENCE

Sends Ultimatum to Hungarian Government to Hand Over the Stipulated Departments.

Paris, Nov. 27.—Rumanian Transylvania has proclaimed its independence and has sent an ultimatum to the Hungarian Government asking that all political, administrative and judicial departments in territories inhabited by Rumanians in Hungary and Transylvania be handed over.

U. S. PRESIDENT TO ARRIVE AT BREST

Will Be Received by Members of the French Government.

Paris, Nov. 27.—It seems decided that President Wilson will land at Brest, according to the Matin. He will be met there by Stephen Pichon, foreign minister, and Georges Leygues, minister of marine, who will welcome him in the name of the French Government. They will accompany him to Paris, where President Poincaré will await the distinguished visitor, surrounded by all the other members of the Government and the chiefs of the Allied armies.

PUBLIC SYMPATHY TO BE ENLISTED IN BABY WELFARE MOVEMENT

Montreal Suffered From High Rate of Mortality Among Infants.

Montreal, Nov. 27.—That, during the past month the death of children under five years of age in Montreal reached the alarmingly high total of 1,090, only 15 per cent of these deaths having resulted from the influenza epidemic, was the report made at the annual meeting of the Affiliated Baby Welfare Stations (English), held last evening. A discussion took place as to the best method of coping with this condition, and it was decided to enlist public sympathy by propaganda as to the need of supporting the work, and to this end a committee was formed.

OCEAN LINER IS BEING REDECORATED FOR THE PRESIDENT AND PARTY

Vessel Now at Hoboken Will Be Ready December 3.

New York, Nov. 27.—The saloons and cabins of the steamship George Washington at Hoboken, which is to take President Wilson and his party to the peace conference, are being redecorated by workmen from the navy yard, and it is expected that she will be ready to move into the harbor on December 3. The camouflage paint on the ship, which is 700 feet long, has been covered over with the regulation steel grey paint used by the American navy.

Toronto, Nov. 27.—A large deputation waited on Premier Hearst this morning, headed by W. B. Doherty, St. Thomas; P. H. Boyer, Ridgeway, and William Woollett of Walkerville, asking that the route of the Quebec to Windsor highway be from London to the border through St. Thomas, Dutton, West Lorne, Ridgeway, Blenheim, Chatham, Tilbury, Walkerville and Windsor.

ISLANDERS GAVE EX-CROWN PRINCE CHILLY RECEPTION

Must Not Leave Lonely Abode Without Special Permission.

Amsterdam, Nov. 22.—The prince bearing the former German crown prince to the island of Wieringen was unable to leave the harbor last night owing to the fog. It turned back and spent the night at Medemblik. When the fog lifted during this morning it started once more and arrived at Wieringen island this afternoon. The prince was given a key reception by the islanders.

EX-CROWN PRINCE IN NO HURRY TO RETURN

London, Nov. 27.—(By the Associated Press).—The former German crown prince has not been seen or heard from his father for weeks up to the time he was taken to the island of Wieringen, according to an interview he gave to newspapermen while on his way through Holland to his present home in the Zuider Zee Island. He said his wife would remain in Germany.

RESTRICTIONS AFFECTING U. S. PUBLICATIONS ARE WITHDRAWN BY BOARD

Washington, Nov. 27.—Withdrawal of all restrictions affecting the publication of periodicals, except daily, Sunday and weekly newspapers, effective immediately, was announced today by the war information board.

WOMEN MAY SAIL FOR ENGLAND NOW IS ORDER

Women and children may now travel to England, according to a telegram received by F. B. Clarke, from the assistant under secretary for external affairs, who were with him when he entered London as a refugee. The former crown prince wore a brown sporting suit with a grey cap and brown leggings and occupied a first-class compartment in the railway train.

Annual Interview With Government Ministers Is Held This Afternoon—Sweeping Changes in Present Conditions Are Strongly Advised.

Ottawa, Nov. 27.—The annual interview of representatives of labor with the Dominion Government with the object of asking for the adoption by Parliament of legislation putting into effect the recommendations of labor as set forth in resolutions passed at the annual meeting of the trades and labor council took place this afternoon. Labor's demands on this occasion were made by Sir Thomas White, minister of finance, and acting premier in the absence of Sir Robert Borden. Hon. Mr. Robertson, the recently-appointed minister of labor; Hon. N. W. Rowell, president of the Privy Council, and several other members of the cabinet at present in the capital, the usual premises of consideration were made by Sir Thomas White.

The labor delegation was headed by Mr. Tom Moore, the new president of the Dominion Trades and Labor Council, who was accompanied by all the members of the Dominion executive with the exception of Secretary-Treasurer Draper, who is labor's representative with Canada's peace delegation as well as representatives of many important labor unions making a representative gathering of about 40 in number. The executive vice-presidents included Arthur Meier, Montreal; Robert Baxter, Glace Bay, N. C., and D. E. Vaudey, vice-presidents of the Trades and Labor Congress.

FORMER KAISER MUST LEAVE HOLLAND IF HIS PRESENCE THERE IMPERILS COUNTRY, DECLARES DUTCH PREMIER

Hospitality of Neutral Government, Says Head of Dutch Ministry, Is Extended to William Hohenzollern as a Private Person Only.

London, Nov. 27.—William Hohenzollern will have to leave Holland if his presence there becomes perilous to the country, Premier Ruijs de Beerenbroek is quoted by the Amsterdam correspondent of the Daily Express as declaring in the second chamber of the Dutch parliament on November 20. "The Kaiser is in Holland as a private person," said the premier, as quoted by the correspondent. "The hospitality of the country is extended to him in accordance with a centuries-old tradition. But it goes without saying that the moment his sojourn becomes a danger to the state he will have to leave. We believe the Kaiser and those with him understand the position, and will depart according to their interests."

WOMAN CANDIDATE DEMANDS THAT EX-KAISER BE TRIED FOR MURDER

London, Nov. 27.—Herbert H. Asquith, Liberal leader, has formally announced that he will oppose his seat for the east district of Fife in the coming elections by Mrs. George E. Hope widow of Lieut.-Col. Hope, who was killed during the war. Col. Hope was a nephew of the Earl of Rosebery, former premier.

PLANS TO PROVIDE WORK TO PREVENT ACUTE DEPRESSION

Hon. A. K. MacLean Formulating a Program To Overcome Such Conditions.

Ottawa, Nov. 27.—To avert acute depression in Canada during the 24 hours of the war, Hon. A. K. MacLean is co-operating with the Canadian Association of Building Industries in formulating a program that will result in the employment of returned soldiers and of munitions workers.

Speaking yesterday at a meeting of the association, Mr. MacLean said that the municipalities alone in Canada are probably nearly a billion dollars behind in construction, due to postponement of works on account of the war. The figure does not include large sums that will be spent by the Dominion and provincial governments, the railways and private corporations, nor does it include huge orders for reconstruction that have been promised to Canada by various European nations.
