This is the second time the Herald as printed a secret military order which the Labor party and the trade unions have been able to use advanageously in political fights. The first ageously in political fights. The first becasion was some weeks ago when the "triple alliance" of three great unions of railway men, miners and transport workers threatened to strike. The order in question was one sent to officers of the forces in England asking them, among other things, to find out and report on the attitude of the enlisted men regarding possible assignment to Russian theatres of war and what they would do in the event of a strike, if required to break it. of a strike, if required to break it.

Pointed questions were asked by labor members in the House of Commons, and the war office admitted authenticity of the order, which called forth a vigorous protest from the trade unions and labor and Socialist organizations all over the country.


