

ARMED MINERS PERSUADED TO ABANDON PLAN

Started Out With the Intention of Compelling Unionization.

GOVERNMENT INTERVENES
Dangerous Situation Avoided
in West Virginia by
Tact.

CHARLESTON, W. Va., Sept. 7.—The several thousand miners who took up a march across country yesterday with the avowed purpose of forcing non-union miners in Logan County to organize, were prevailed upon today to desist in their efforts by Governor Cornwall and Frank Keeney, president of district No. 17, United Mineworkers. The miners were started back to their homes in special trains this afternoon.

CHARLESTON, K. Va., Sept. 6.—Five hundred miners, who left Oak Grove this morning to march across the mountains to Coal River, where they said they intended to make a unionization in mines, were joined at Racine, on the Little Coal River, by 3,000 more men, according to word received by Governor John J. Cornwell shortly before noon. All of the men are said to be armed. W. M. Petty, vice-president of district No. 7, United Mineworkers of America, said 4,000 armed miners were on the march. Mr. Petty said the men had refused to listen to the governor's appeal last night that they return to their homes, and he predicted trouble at Coal River "unless the miners' demands are granted." He estimated the marchers would be joined by a force of 25,000 men when they reach Logan County.

MAJOR SCHROEDER MADE BEST RECORD IN AERIAL DERBY

But Debarred From Taking
Cash Prize, Which Goes
To Civilian.

NEW YORK, Sept. 7.—Although Major R. W. Schroeder, pilot of a Vought training plane, was today named officially winner of the American Flying Club's international handicap airplane contest and reliability race, which was held between Mineola and Toronto during the week of August 15, R. H. Depeu, a civilian flier, who piloted a Curtiss plane, was announced as winner of the first prize of \$10,000. A war department ruling prevented military entrants from competing for cash prizes. To determine the winners the club's contest committee took from the government's records the theoretical performance of each machine with a maximum useful load of fuel, oil and passengers. This theoretical load was used as a basis for determining the relative performances of the machines with the load actually carried. The VE-7 registered 107.8 percent, and Depeu's JN-4 measured 106.

WILSON WILL FIGHT FOR NATIONS LEAGUE LONG AS HE LIVES

Peace Treaty Charter For
New World Order.

RESPECTS THE SENATE

But Is Fighting For Cause
Greater Than the
Senate.

KANSAS CITY, Sept. 6.—President Wilson appealed to the Kansas City mass meeting today to support the peace treaty as a charter for a new order of world affairs.

The people, said the president, had been misled about the treaty "by men who looked at everything with jaundiced eyes or those who have some private interests of their own." When these men were "gibbeted" by public opinion, he said, "they will regret that the gibbets are so high."

"If anybody dare to defeat this great instrument," he continued, "then they will have to gather together their counsellors for the world and do something better. A nation will not save the world."

"Germany," said the president, "would be the only one left out of the league, unless we intend to stay out and come in later with Germany."

League a Solution.
Alluding to the American promise to set the Philippines free, Mr. Wilson said the league would solve the "very perplexing" problem of how they were to be kept free after their independence had been granted.

The president asked the audience not to think he had come out to "fight or antagonize" anybody.

"I have the greatest respect," he said, "for the Senate of the United States. But I have come out to fight a cause that is greater than the Senate, and I intend to fight that cause, in office or out, as long as I live."

Cobalt Miners Decide To Call Off the Strike

Mass Meeting Votes To Accept
Terms Offered by the
Managers.

COBALT, Sept. 7.—The miners' strike for six weeks is over. The union held a mass meeting here this afternoon, and decided to call off the strike, and accept the terms offered by the mine managers. The men will return to work at 7 o'clock on Monday morning.

The meeting was a very spirited one. The executive committee recommended that the strike be called off, but this was opposed by the radical element, who put up a desperate fight for the continuance of the strike. They were, however, outvoted on the issue. A mass meeting of 23,000 miners and a loss of about \$1,250,000 in production.

FRENCH AIRMAN WINS DE LA MEURTHE CUP

PARIS, Friday, Sept. 5.—The French aviator, Sadi Lecoq, won the cup donated by Henry De La Meurthe, president of the Aero Club of France, by flying around Paris on Tuesday last by way of St. Germain, Meaux and Melun, a distance of 200 kilometres (124 miles), in 48 minutes 8 seconds. Lecoq made an average speed of 240 kilometres 307 metres an hour. The cup was last won in 1914 by the late Emile Gilbert, whose speed was 175 kilometres an hour.

FUTURE OF BRITISH INDUSTRY DEPENDS ON TRADES CONGRESS

Chief Subject of Debate Will
Refer To Direct Action To
Force Nationalization of
Coal Mines—850 Dele-
gates.

GLASGOW, Sept. 7.—(By the Associated Press).—The most intense interest is being displayed in tomorrow's trades union congress which will be the greatest ever held in Great Britain. Five and a quarter million workers are represented by 850 delegates, who have a number of questions to decide, which will have the most important bearing on the future of British industry.

The most significant subject for debate refers to direct action by the workers in order to obtain nationalization of the mines, which is strongly demanded by a powerful group of underground workers. It is expected that Robert Williams, who is strongly opposed to such action, and Robert Williams, who is strongly in favor of it, will be met by antagonists such as Arthur Henderson, Joe Havelock, Henry Thomas, William E. Thorn and William Bruce, who in a question is raised, which it is understood will occur on Tuesday.

STRATFORD, Sept. 7.—Stratford opened its arms to the officers and men of the 34th Battalion on the occasion of their first annual reunion. Several hundred were present from all parts of Western Ontario.

All morning the veterans arrived by rail, motor and other conveyances, and the morning was spent in renewing acquaintances and exchanging reminiscences. At 11:30 the battalion paraded in front of the armories, and between long lines of cheering citizens, Lieut.-Col. Oliver led them in the march to the park where dinner was served.

Col. Oliver of Galt, officer commanding the battalion, praised the men for their gallant actions under fire. "This has been one of the proudest moments of my life," he said. "It has been the same spirit that has prevailed in the old 34th, and now you would be willing to go out and do the same thing again." He paid tribute to those men who had fallen.

Extends Freedom.
On behalf of the city, Mayor Stevenson extended the freedom of the city to the veterans. G. G. McPherson, K.C., Major Coleman, D.S.O., M.C., of Galt, and J. J. Macdonald, M.C., of Stratford, all spoke briefly expressing another such reunion.

Although nothing definite was decided, it was understood that the officers favor Stratford as the place of the next year's reunion. A banquet of the officers will be held at Galt on January 25, at which time some definite action will be taken for an auto ride about the city, over one hundred cars being in the procession.

STRATFORD WINS A lacrosse game between Hespeler and Stratford resulted in a win for Stratford by about seven goals. The game was quite interesting, and the players were well matched. An exhibition boxing match was held between Frank Gillette and J. Lewis, both of Stratford, two young lads, and this proved interesting.

The general idea of the committee was not to have too much of a set program, but to permit the party the greatest possible opportunity to renew old friendships made in the training period and later in the war. A bright sun lent its warmth to the welcome of the citizens.

PRINCE ENJOYING REAL FISHERMAN'S WEATHER ON TRIP

Reports From Party Indicate
That Catch Has Been
Good.

Nipigon, Ont., Sept. 7.—Fisher's weather has been the lot of the royal party for the last 24 hours of the Prince of Wales' sojourn in the Nipigon waters. Showery and cool under grey skies, the weather has been favorable for good fishing and reports from the party indicate that the catch has been good.

The camp at Pine Point from which the royal party are proceeding on their trip is probably the biggest ever seen in the district. Forty-three Indian guides alone are required to pilot the fleet of twenty-two canoes through the fire in the camp. It is a camp de luxe house in Nipigon. The Indian chief is a cook of distinction. Several of the guides are famed for skill and daring in negotiating the rapids of the river, and the young pilot, Jack McKirdy, is a fisherman with a record.

The prince will return to the royal Cameron Falls, and will proceed west to resume the official program, beginning with Fort William and Port Arthur Monday afternoon.

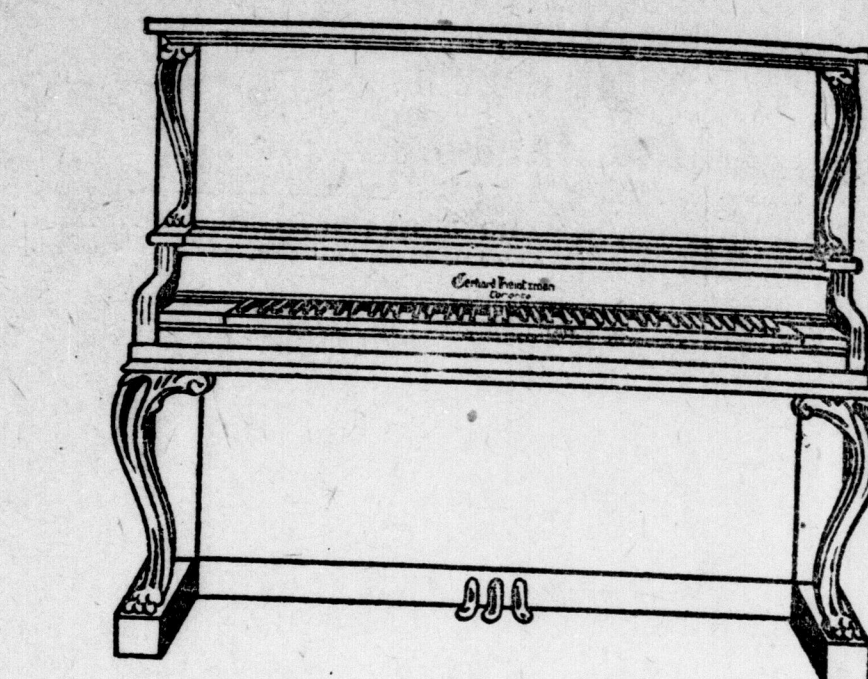
MONTREAL MAN, SHOT BY HIS SWEETHEART, DIES IN HOSPITAL

BOLSHEVIKI TO BEGIN PEACE NEGOTIATIONS WITH THE ESTHONIANS

London, Sept. 7.—Peace negotiations between the Estonian and Bolshevik governments will begin at Pskov on Wednesday next, according to a Moscow wireless message.

A Bolshevik wireless message received here reports the capture by the Bolsheviks of the town of Tobolsk, capital of West Siberia, and of the Government of Tobolsk. The capture of the town of Tobolsk, Province of Turkestan, is also reported. Four thousand prisoners and many guns, the message says, were taken.
