EX-LICENSE INSPECTOR AT WINDSOR IS FINED \$2,000 UNDER O. T. A.

Large Consignment of Liquor Found Upon His Premises.

WINDSOR, July 2.—Paul Morand of Tecumseh, former provincial license inspector for Essex County, who was succeeded here by License Inspector M. N. Rousseau, the present incumbent of that office, appeared in Windsor police court today and was fined \$2,000 for selling liquor illegally. He also faced a charge of having liquor in other than a lawful place, but was acquitted, although Magistrate Miers declared that, technically, he was guilty. GARAGE CONSTRUCTED THIRTY-TWO LIBERAL CONTRARY TO CIVIC UNIONISTS REMAIN BYLAW, IS CLAIM WITH GOVERNMENT

Builders' Association Says the Fire Area Bylaw Has Been Contravened.

CITIZENS BENEFIT

Fund of \$825 Distributed Amongst 12 Householders On Talbot Street.

ST. THOMAS, July 2.—The Bricklayers' Association entered a protest at the meeting of the board of works tonight to the construction of a garage next to the International Hotel. The association insists that there has been a violation of the building bylaw. The board of works, however, decided to allow the construction of the garage, claiming that the material is mostly frame and is within the limits provided for by the ordinance within which the construction of buildings must be built.

The manager of the garage department was ordered to purchase a supply of hay from the city. The hay was to be used for the construction of the garage. The city engineer, Mr. J. H. Martin, for the location of a gasoline pump and tank on Railway street was not entered.

THE FUND DISTRIBUTED. Sir Sam Annoyed At Tories Parading Under Another Cloak.

OTTAWA, July 2.—(By Canadian Press.)—The name of the newly-constituted National Liberal and Conservative party does not appeal to Sir Sam Hughes. Sir Sam wanted to return to the name of straight Liberal-Conservative party, and this morning he expressed dissatisfaction with the choice of yesterday's conference. As to the leadership and future of the party he was very much in doubt.

"I was elected as a Unionist," declared Sir Sam today to the Canadian Press. "I was and am a Conservative, and the name Liberal-Conservative is the one which should have been adopted. I have supported the Government and will do so only so far as it carries out along the lines of Conservative policy."

The name National Liberal and Conservative party has too much flavor of the past, and the party would be well advised to keep away from that, for it will give the suspicion of big interests behind the Government."

As to the leadership, he remarked that for three or four weeks back there had been a big boom in favor of Sir Sam Hughes. He thought that might have an effect on the choice.

LIKELY RESUME WORK ON HYDRO CANAL MONDAY



Tom Moore Raps Beck and Commission Members in Address.

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., July 2.—Indications point to a resumption of work on the Hydro Canal Monday morning. The steam and electric locomotive engineers today finally withdrew from the trades union federation, and will look after their own business with the Hydro-Electric Commission. It is understood they will start work on the canal Monday. The steam shovel men expect also to reach a settlement and start at the same time.

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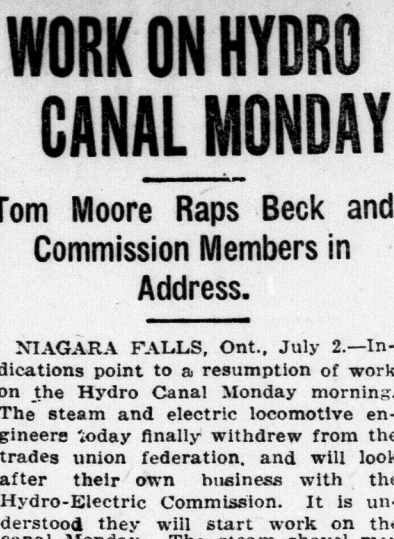
