

## AVERAGE CORN ACREAGE DESPITE BAD WEATHER

Price Current Speaks Favorably of  
Crops—Liverpool Lower, But  
Chicago Prices Are Firm.

**World Office,**  
Thursday Evening, June 11.  
Liverpool wheat futures closed to-day  
14 to 15d lower than yesterday, and corn  
futures unchanged.

At Chicago July wheat closed higher  
than yesterday, July corn 1/4c higher,  
and July oats 1/4c higher.

Winnipeg carlots wheat to-day, 10c;  
year ago, 14c.

Chicago car lots to-day: Wheat 18,  
contract 1, corn 23, 1/2, oats 12, 1/2, 1/2,  
Northwest car lots, 20c, 20c, wheat 10,  
14c, year ago, 14c.

Broomhast estimates Argentine exports  
for the week at 2,400,000 bushels, against  
1,800,000 actual last week and 2,800,000 last  
year, corn estimated at 2,400,000, against  
2,450,000 and 1,800,000, respectively.

**Price Currents:** In western portions  
of the central regions continued rain has  
been dry. The rains have been favorable  
for small grain and grass crops, but  
have delayed work in corn fields and de-  
layed the finishing of planting. The dry  
weather has been unfavorable in Indiana  
and Ohio, and rain is now desirable in  
many sections of these states. The re-  
ports concerning winter wheat continue  
to reflect promise of a good crop. Cut-  
ting is expected to begin in some local-  
ities within ten days. While reports are  
not uniformly good, there is a good gen-  
eral prospect, and but little of serious  
detriment has developed in the past few  
weeks. The scattered unfavorable advices  
reflect more of local conditions, and to  
some extent appear to be more in the  
nature of fears than actual damage. Oats  
are doing fairly well, but more rain is  
wanted in Ohio to insure a good crop.  
Corn planting is not all completed, as  
rains have continued to interfere with  
the work and with cultivation in Ohio  
and Kansas, but in Indiana, Illinois and  
Ohio the planting is nearly finished, and  
a liberal or full acreage appears to be  
likely in the central regions.
