Express Messengers Entrusted With Delivery of Money and Property Draw Meagre Salaries of \$30 to \$55 a Month,

Is the Canadian Express Co. able to make such enormous profits (100 per cent. per annum) by reason of the meagre salaries paid to its employes? If the facts are as stated by some of the employes, it is surely a case for investigation by the board of railway

commissioners.

Take, for instance, the train running between Toronto and North Bay, a distance of 227 miles. The express messengers cover this every day on the day runs and every night on the night runs and handle on an average every day about \$50,000. This money is entrusted to their care, as well as a whole carful of freight, which must be all checked and handled carefully, and should any parcel be broken or damshould any parcel be broken or damaged the messengers or porters are held responsible and made to pay for them. The company never pays any loss. It always comes out of the employes. On this particular run the Express Company pays \$55 per month to its messengers.

On the run to Stratford the company pays \$50 for doubling the road every day, and on the return trip handling two carloads of express.

Work For \$30 a Month.

On the run from Hamilton to Meaford on the Northern Division, the company pays its messengers \$30 a month, and on this run there is as much express handled as there is on the main line from Toronto to Montreal, and engraphics sums of money.
