Pears Better in Quality and Brought Higher

There was another heavy market yesterday, especially so for Monday, when shipments are usually lighter.

Peaches were shipped in in large quantities and sold as follows: Six-quart flats, at 20c to 30c; six-quart lenos, at 25c to 40c, with a very few extra choice bringing 45c and 50c; the 11-quart flats at 25c to 50c, mostly going at 35c and 40c, and the 11-quart lenos at 27½c to 75c, a very few extra choice bringing 85c to 51.

Plums were not shipped so heavily, the prices ranging about the same as on Saturday, the 11-quarts selling at 40c to 85c, according to quality.
