## Abdication of Greek King Reported to Be Imminent

London, April 30.—The report that King Constantine of Greece is soon to abdicate is reiterated in a despatch from Rome to The Star, which says it has been confirmed from neutral diplomatic sources. It is suggested that the king and queen may land at an Italian port and proceed overland to Denmark.

## Golf Dealers in West Rated Good Amateurs

Chicago, April 30.—For the first time since its formation in 1899 the Western Golf Association has severed diplomatic relations with the United States Golf Association regarding the amateur rule. For 18 years the rules of the organization have been practically the same, but after May 1 they will differ enough to cause friction and possibly a breach of wider dimensions.

On that date a "Definition and regulation of amateurism in golf" recently transcribed on the books of the W. G. A. will go into effect.
