VON BERNSTORFF WILL BE ASKED TO EXPLAIN

Otherwise State Department Will Not Give Up Papers Seized From Von Igel.

NEW SITUATION ARISES

Documents Said to Have Dealt With Matters Affecting American Neutrality.

WASHINGTON, April 22.—Papers seized in New York by the department of justice from Wolfe Von Igel, former secretary of Capt. Franz Von Papen, revealed German military attaches will not be restored to the German embassy until Count Von Bernstorff returns to Washington from a week-end trip. The German embassy has been informed the documents will be returned and retained meanwhile by the state department. State department officials reiterated today that Count Von Bernstorff will be asked to explain the contents of the documents and to explain the official and personal nature of the documents.

It was not believed today that the German embassy would agree to this procedure, contending there is no authority for the removal of papers of any kind from the person or possession of a diplomatic agent. Embassy officials are disturbed at the idea that the department of justice intends to keep photographic copies of the papers, and it was said today that Count Von Bernstorff would demand not only the originals, but all photographic copies, plates and a catalog of the documents which is understood to have been made by the justice department. Ambassador Bernstorff is understood to be following instructions from Berlin.

The documents arrived at the DoJ today from New York. They comprise the contents of two portfolios and several letter files. There are several hundred papers in all. While officials declined to discuss the papers, it was noted that the same of the documents were said to have passed between Count Von Bernstorff and Capt. Von Toppert, the withdrawn military German attaché, dealing with matters affecting American neutrality. Some department of justice officials reiterated today the opinion that the law does not hold immune from seizure documents of a foreign nation found in a private office, such as they of Von Igel's, was entirely apart from the embassy or consulate.

Von Igel's immunity from prosecution as an employee of the German embassy was not accepted by department officials. Immunity, it was said, was interpreted as extending only to the ambassador and his household servants.

HUNGARIAN NEWSPAPERS MAKE A CRY FOR PEACE

Significant Symptom Regarding Hapsburg Monarchy Shown in Outburst.

MAKE SEPARATE STATES

Proposal of Germany Would Enable Her to Swallow Territory More Readily.

LONDON, April 22.—The Daily Telegraph's Milan correspondent says that a significant symptom regarding the Hapsburg monarchy is shown by an outburst of the Hungarian newspapers in favor of peace. Premier Asquith's recent speech regarding peace conditions, the despatch says, has been commended by Hungarians who are anxious on account of German aggressiveness respecting small nationalities at the end of the war.

In connection with the visit to Berlin, made by Baron Burian, Austrian-Hungarian foreign minister, it is suggested that Germany proposed that the Hapsburg monarchy should be divided into small autonomous states, presumably in order that they may be more easily swallowed up by Germany. The Slav nationalities, it is hinted, are to be given the minimum of liberty, Galicia also receiving autonomy.

ALLISON EXPECTED IN OTTAWA MONDAY

Prominent Figure in Investigation Will Be in Touch With His Solicitor.

OTTAWA, Ont., April 22.—Col. John Wesley Allison, who figures so prominently in the Kytte charges, to be investigated by the royal commission next week, will arrive in the city on Monday morning. Yesterday he crossed over from Ogdensburg to Prescott and greeted a number of friends.

In Ogdensburg he spent most of his time at the club or at the hotel with members of his family. Today he will be moving down to Morrisburg, and will spend Sunday at his home in that town. On Monday Col. Allison will come to Ottawa, and will be in touch with his solicitor, Geo. F. Henderson, K.C., from that time on.

HOW TO PRESERVE EGGS.

An Inexpensive Method Which Anyone Can Use.

Eggs may be successfully preserved for many months in a solution of water-glass. One quart of water-glass, which may be purchased from any drugist for twenty-five cents, is enough to preserve twenty dozen eggs. Ten quarts of water, four boiling point, are allowed to cool. Pour the water into a five-gallon crock, and mix the two. Place the eggs in the solution as soon as laid. The crock is filled to within two inches of the top with the liquid, and is stored in a cool, dry place.

BAKED FINNAN HADDOCK.

Select a thick haddock and allow it to lie in milk for one hour, then put it into the roasting pan with a little of the milk, butter it and bake about thirty minutes. Serve on a hot platter with a little sauce made from the dish gravy and a little added cream.

ATTACK BRITISH CAMP ON SUEZ BY AEROPLANE

Turkish War Office Claims to Have "Pelted Successfully" the Enemy Troops.

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 22, via London, 4:55 p.m.—

A British camp on the Suez Canal has been attacked by a Turkish aeroplane, the war office announced today. The airship dropped bombs and returned successfully. The announcement follows:
"On April 20 one of our aeroplanes carried out a flight of 300 kilometres (about 200 miles) over the desert to El Kantara, on the Suez Canal, in three hours, and there pelted successfully with bombs the enemy troops in camp. The aeroplanes returned undamaged."

THE NEW TABLE LAMPS.

WHEAT PRICES DOWN.
CHICAGO, April 22.—Uncertainty of the diplomatic outlook tended today to pull down prices in the wheat market. The bearish nature of the Kansas crop report had also a perceptible influence. On the other hand, the fact that weather conditions northwest threatened further delay to spring seeding operated somewhat as a check on declines.

Opening quotations, which varied from the same as Thursday's close to one-half lower, with May at 113 1/2 to 114 and July at 112 1/2 to 113 1/2, were followed by slight rallies and then a decided setback all around.

POTATO LOAVES.

One pound potatoes, boiled and mashed; one ounce butter, one teaspoon milk, one egg, butter, salt and cayenne pepper, one teaspoon chopped parsley.
Add butter, milk, egg, parsley and seasoning to cold potatoes. Turn into loaf. Put into a buttered baking sheet, glaze with the white of an egg. Bake in a quick oven for five or ten minutes.

FISH PUDDING.

Take two and a half pounds of roach boiled fish, add to it a small onion, a hard-boiled egg, two chopped hard-boiled eggs, pepper, salt, a gill of butter and a gill of milk. Turn into a loaf and a buttered pudding mould and tie a flannel cloth over the top. Steam in a steamer for two hours or boil for one hour. Unmould on a hot dish and pour spoon drawn butter over the pudding.

LUNCHEON SUGGESTIONS.

Popcorn chrysanthemums are very attractive for ladies' luncheons. Make a boiled frosting exactly as you would make for a cake, using a cupful of sugar, a tablespoonful of vinegar and the whites of four eggs. When the frosting is done, stir into it three cups of freshly-popped corn. Spread thin round crackers with this mixture and bake in a moderate oven until they have turned a delicate brown.

Sautéed Green Peas.
One pint of shelled peas, two ounces of butter, one-half teaspoonful of chopped mint. Boil the peas until nearly tender. Strain. Melt the butter in a saucepan, add the peas and mint. Sauté for five minutes. Serve at once.

PICKLED BEET ROOT.
Two beet roots, pepper, salt and vinegar. Wash the beet root, taking care not to break the surface. Bake in a slow oven for about three hours. When cold peel and slice thin, sprinkle with pepper and salt, pour over a little vinegar. Leave for a few hours before serving.
