Mr. McMulkin was here placing in local factories in which women are employed the prescribed notices in regard to the number of hours which they shall work during a day. Under the law the women can't be kept at work longer than ten hours a day except in cases of emergency when they may work for thirteen hours. They shall not work, however, more than thirty-six days of thirteen hours in any one year. Oppies of the section of the Factory Act relating to this matter have to be posted in every factory in which women are employed. They are signed by the inspector and by the manager of the factory.

Mr. McMulkin went from Sackville to Moncton and thence to his home in St. John.
