KILLED HIMSELF

NEW YORK, July 22.—His mind upset by close study and brooding over Christian Science, Eugene Howe, a butler employed by Dr. Gregory Costigan, of No. 63 West Eighty-sixth street, committed suicide by jumping from the fourth story of the house early yesterday morning.

\$75,000 FIRE AT ROCKPORT

A Nova Scotia Schooner Burned to the Water's Edge—Aid Summoned From Camden.

ROCKPORT, July 22.—The fire which broke out shortly before midnight and completely destroyed the plant of the Bell's Lime company and the Rockport Ice company and the residence of Joseph Richards, causing a total loss estimated at between \$80,000 and \$75,000, was placed under control early Monday after burning fiercely for four hours.
