High Cost of Watch Repairing.

(Wall Street Journal.) Have you broken your watch and then wondered why it cost 50 to 200 per cent more to repair it than in past years? If you blamed it on the war, you hit the nail on the head. Before the war, large quantities of watch parts, especially those the more easily broken, were im- ported from Switzerland, but now only small shipments are received. American companies turn out these parts, but high cost of materials and labor has had its effect, and the lure of munition profits has made itself felt. The more delicate parts of guns and shells, such as time fuses, are now manufactured by domestic watch companies, which takes skilled labor from other lines or watch making.

'By gosh,' he said, 'I've struck a silver mine,' and straightening up, he felt something cold slide down his leg. Another quarter lay at his feet. He grasped the truth. There was a hole in his pocket."
