

One half cup molasses.
Three-quarters teaspoon soda.

One teaspoon salt.

Two tablespoons melted butter.

Mix and sift dry ingredients, add milk molasses, and combine mixtures; and add butter. Ginger Pudding:

Half cup sugar.

One quarter teaspoon salt.
Two teaspoons ginger.
One cup milk.
Turn into a buttered mould. Cover and steam two hours.
