Students Advised to Shun Masculinity and Dowdiness — Knowledge Not Enough

New York, Dec. 21.—Members of the freshman class of the New York Medical College and Hospital for Women who assembled yesterday in the student's room to present a piano to their alma mater were somewhat startled when the dean, Dr. Cornelia C. Brant, told them that mere knowledge would never put them in the front ranks of their profession.

"If you want to be successful physicians," she said, "you must be good-looking and you must be well dressed. I don't mean, of course, that a doctor needs the wardrobe of a fashionable debutante. She does, however, need the beauty that is the result of careful attention to hair, skin and teeth, and her clothes must be well made, becoming and thoroughly up-to-date.

"Most of those who employ a woman physician employ her because she is a

woman. They want the womanly sympathy—the feminine lightness of touch. If the woman physician has a door-knob coiffure, rough hands, a stiff, ugly shirtwaist, frayed skirt and boots with run-down heels she cannot express the charm that is really her birthright.

"In order to compete with men in the medical profession you must have not only knowledge and skill equal to that of the men, but you must cultivate certain qualities which belong exclusively to women. Those who prefer the masculine personality and attributes in a physician will employ a man. You can not therefore hope to appeal to this class by aping masculine dress or manners and you will inevitably lose prestige with patients who like the soft voice, the soothing touch and the general pleasing harmony that belong to the cultured and well-groomed woman."

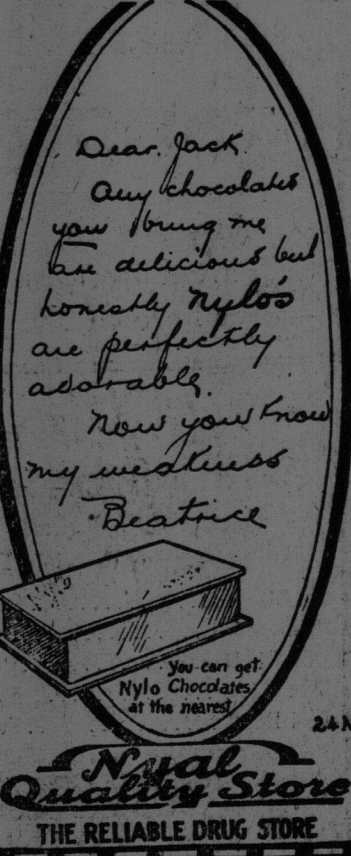

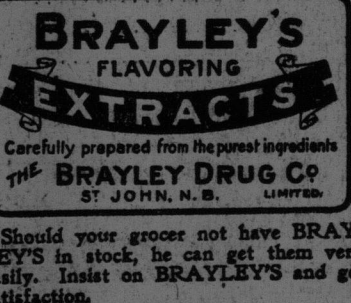

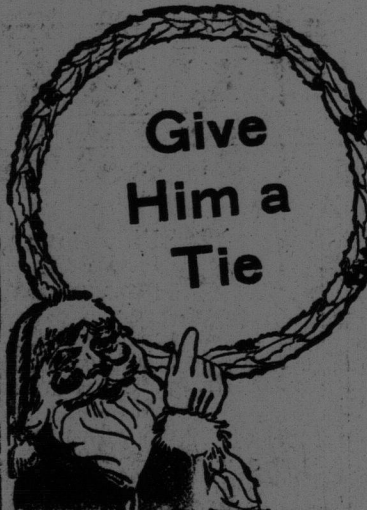

What is a Modern Brewery!

A modern brewery is not only a gigantic machine, but also a gigantic laboratory, every part of which is not only thoroughly and spotlessly clean, but also completely and perfectly sterilized.

The marvelous devices and machinery of the modern brewery compared with the old are apparent.

These improvements, however, are trifling, if compared with those brought into the science and methods of brewing.

Unfortunately very few of these methods can be shown here.

Note that all vessels, mash tubs, filter tub, kettle, cooler, fermenter, storage tanks are hermetically closed to guard against infection from the multitude of germs contained in flying dust.

Every beer pipe, pump or vessel containing beer manufactured or in process of manufacture, is frequently flushed and sterilized.

Note also, the immense storage rooms filled with glass-lined tanks. These permit the thorough ageing of the beer, without imparting to it any rosin or varnish taste as is so often the case with wooden casks.

To these conditions is due the remarkably clean and unvarying taste of the different Frontenac brands and also their wonderful digestibility.

HOW FRONTENAC BEER IS MADE

- 1.—The malt received in car-loads is elevated to the malt bins.
- 2.—The malt from these bins is ground in the mill and elevated to the mash-tub.
- 3.—In the mash-tub, the malt and water are thoroughly mixed by a powerful propeller turned by a 35 horse-power electric motor, and forms what is known as the wort.
- 4.—The wort flows from the mash-tub to the filter-tub where the grains are strained and sent down to the grain tank, and the extract of malt flows to the kettle to be boiled.
- 5.—In the kettle, the extract is boiled by steam and the hops are inserted there.
- 6.—After boiling, the extract is forced by a powerful electric pump to the upper story of the fermenting room and goes through the serpentine enclosed cooler and thence to the enclosed glass-lined fermenters, where yeast is added.
- 7.—After eight days in the fermenter, the beer flows to the storage tanks for ageing. Note the cooling pipes under the ceiling.
- 8.—Before going to the bottle or keg fillers, the beer is thoroughly filtered.
- 9.—The kegs used are of glass-lined steel to insure thorough cleanliness. These are mechanically scrubbed on the outside and get four powerful sprayings inside, hot and cold water alternately.
- 10.—The brewery has been most fortunate in finding on its premises an artesian well, yielding an unlimited supply of water of the very best quality that could be desired for brewing. This water is extremely cold and of great value for cooling the beer and also the ice-machine condensers.
