FARMING AT A LOSS

Large Percentage of American Farmers Lose on Food Stuffs

Ask any farmer how much each dollar he has received in return cost him to produce. Ask him whether the expenditure of one dollar in capital and labor returned him \$1.10 or ninety cents.

He can't answer. The debit side of the ledger is a void so far as he is concerned, and the part played in the production of an acre of corn by such items as rent of land, interest and depreciation of machinery, man labor and horse labor, has never entered into his calculations. If he should sit down and figure out his business in all the minutiae of detail that is necessary for the proper conduct of their business undertakings, mercantile or manufacturing, he might find that he was actually producing crops at a loss. A large percentage of American farmers, probably the majority of them, actually are producing foodstuffs at a loss, on the basis of the science of modern business.—Van Vleet Adling in Book-Keeper for June.



"Bring out a text and tell stories all round it," the reply given by the Lord Statistbury of Canada—the late Mayor Howard of Toronto.

Stories are remembered even by the densest intellects. "Stories," says Bunkin, "Are traps set attractively baited which in time will spring and hold." Robert Louis Stevenson said: "Stories are not the same as reason, but are vastly more convincing."

The parables or stories of Jesus have been like a pillar of fire to the Bible student and a pillar of cloud to the unbeliever of all time, facts about the Kingdom which He was about to establish and which have been as clear as the light of day to His own.

His disciples said: "Why speakest Thou in parables?" He answered, "because it is the Kingdom of Heaven, but unto them it is not given. Therefore speak I unto them in parables because they seeing see not and hearing they hear not, neither do they understand." Blessed are your eyes for they see and your ears for they hear.

Jesus is at the seaside. He is down at the beach. Some one hears of it, perhaps a summer visitor, who hastens to tell all the cottagers; perhaps it was a fisherman who hastened to tell his friends, or a shepherd, as he drove his flock to the little brook that emptied into the sea, for soon a crowd gathered.

What do they say? "Hurry, you may be too late to see Him walk the sea, as though it were dry land." "Make haste, for even now he is commanding the winds and waves to be still." "Will He perform a miracle, do you think?" "How I wish He would heal some one with a touch."

The excited, curious crowd surrounds Him, steps into a fine boat and, seating Himself tells them the parable of the sower, or rather the parable of the soil, which may even now be commanding the winds and waves to be still. "Behold a sower went forth to sow, as he sowed some seed fell by the wayside," the land he sowed his seed into the unplowed and unbroken grain field. Here it lay in full view of the crows who were not long in picking away the seed.

"Some fell on stony places where they had not much earth." Where the dry underlying rock held the seed, but the hot sun and the wind dried it up, and the seed was scorched.

"Some fell among thorns," in land where the thistles grew fifteen feet high.

No wonder that its roots were crowded out and all the nitrogen, ammonia, and potash that should have gone to the good seed was absorbed by the thistles.

"But other fell into good ground," clean soil, well tilled, that was quick to respond that was productive, and the yield was thirty, and sixty, and even one hundred per cent.

Hear ye the parable of the sower? "The Word is the seed." (Luke 8:11) It has life and power of growth and of reproduction. It needs no inoculation with nitrogen fixing bacteria to ensure a catch, for His Word will not return to Him void. A germ of truth planted in the heart converts one to God, he in turn sows the seed in another heart and so on in ever widening circles and in a few years the good seed will have been sown in every nook and corner of the world's great harvest field.

The seed of truth falls on four classes of hearers.

The first are like the trodden path so hard that nothing but the plow of adversity can break them up and put them in condition to receive the Word. The seed soon is quickly tramped away by the devil, who is ever on the alert to keep the seed from sinking into the hearts of men.

SAND IN PEPPER ANALYST DECLARES

Don't make a mistake and wait until the special fruit in season is nearly over and then pay the highest prices for it.

Don't think overripe, soft fruit makes good preserves or jellies. Don't ever use anything but the best materials for good results.

Don't use what is called "A" or "soft" white sugar or brown sugar or granulated white sugar for preserves or jellies. Don't use an over-abundance of spices; too much makes it taste bitter.

Don't make spiced fruit too sweet; four pounds of light brown sugar to seven pounds of fruit is a good proportion.

Don't use an over-abundance of spices; too much makes it taste bitter.

Don't cover preserves or jellies while cooking; they are apt to boil over.

Don't use cold sugar for jellies; measure the strained fruit juice; to each pint allow one pound of the best granulated sugar; put it on a platter in a warm oven to heat, and add it to the boiling liquid.

Don't put hot preserves in cold glasses or jars and not expect accidents; have the glasses or jars in scalding water, rinse well, then fill as quickly as possible.

Don't allow preserves to stand about after they are cold; put muffled paraffin on cover with lid, wash off every trace of stickiness, and put in a cool, dark, dry place for future use.

Don't expect to make good preserves "hit or miss"; they require great care combined with the best materials and exact measurement to insure success.

Don't expect preserves to cook over a hot fire and not expect them to stick and burn.

Don't let them cook without stirring, even when the fire is slow.

Don't cook preserves on a gas range without an asbestos mat.

Don't use a thin waste sauce pan; an old-fashioned porcelain-lined iron preserving kettle is best.

Don't think you can hurry preserves; it is out of the question to do so and get have them perfect.

Don't forget to rub the bottom of the preserving kettle freely with olive oil to prevent sticking.

Don't neglect to drop apples, pears, peaches and all light colored fruit into a bowl of cold water as you do them to prevent discoloration before cooking.

Usually the man who sits at the head of the table does all the work and takes that is left.

HOW TO DEAL WITH THE FLY NUISANCE

House flies are now recognized as most serious carriers of the germs of certain diseases such as typhoid fever, tuberculosis, infantile diarrhoea, etc.

They infect themselves in filth and decaying substances, and by carrying the germs on their legs and bodies they pollute food, especially milk, with the germs of these and other diseases and of decay.

No fly is free from germs. The best method is to prevent their breeding.

House flies breed in decaying or decomposed food, chamber or receptacles, and it should be regularly removed within six days in the summer. Farm-yard manure should be regularly removed within the same time and either spread on the fields or stored at a distance of not less than a quarter of a mile, the further the better, from a house or dwelling.

House flies breed in such decaying and fermenting matter as kitchen refuse and garbage. Garbage receptacles should be kept tightly covered.

The same flies should be burnt or buried within a few days, but at once if possible. No refuse should be left exposed. If it cannot be disposed of at once it should be sprinkled with chloride of lime.

Flies in Houses

Windows and doors should be properly screened, especially those of the dining room and kitchen. Milk and other food should be screened in the summer by covering it with muslin; fruit should be covered also.

Where they are used, especially in public places as hotels, etc., spittoons should be kept clean as there is very great danger of flies carrying the germs of consumption from unclean spittoons.

Flies should not be allowed to have access to the sink room, especially in the case of infectious disease.

The faces of babies should be carefully screened with muslin.


Flies may be killed by means of a weak solution of formalin or formaldehyde composed in saucers in the dining room. Copies of the above circular, printed in large type, on cardboard, may be had on application to the Division of Entomology, Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa.
