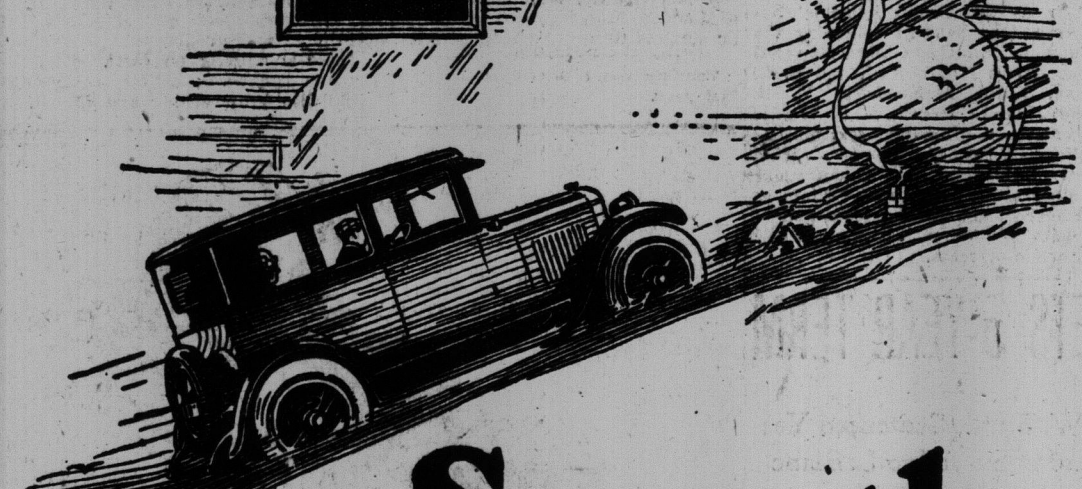

in the interests of W. C. T. U. work. The present membership, Mrs. Wright said, was about 22,000 and there were chains of Women's Christian Temperance Unions throughout the Dominion from Atlantic to Pacific. She was returning from a delightful visit in Bermuda with her husband and stopped on her way to her home in London, Ont., to stimulate the interest in the W. C. T. U. in New Brunswick.

She has already held very successful meetings in Moncton, Sackville, Fredericton and St. Stephen, and everywhere has had a very fine response to her plea for interest and support for the union and its ideals. Many new members have been enrolled and two new organizations have been formed, one at Sackville and one at Moncton.

A re-doubling of the Loyal Temperance Legion membership is another of the objectives of the national branch. The Loyal Temperance Legion members are the juniors and at the present time there is a world-wide movement to enroll the children. In the United States last year, Mrs. Wright said, there were 1,000,000 children enrolled in the junior temperance leagues and since coming to New Brunswick she has enlisted between 200 and 300 of the children under this banner.

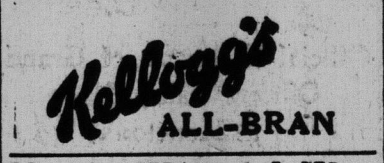
Mrs. Wright last visited Saint John about ten years ago when the National W. C. T. U. convention was held in this city. She regretted that New Brunswick had not been making such gains in W. C. T. U. membership as she had hoped and she felt that it had been a mistake to think of the W. C. T. U. as having fulfilled its purpose when prohibition became the law. She pointed out that law enforcement was as much the objective of the W. C. T. U. as temperance legislation.

TO GIVE PUBLIC ADDRESS. This afternoon Mrs. Wright will give a public address in Orange Hall, Germain street. She will remain in Saint John until Tuesday and plans are being made for her to give an address on Bermuda, its problems and its beauties on Monday. After leaving Saint John she will visit Chatham, Newcastle and Campbellton, before returning to London.

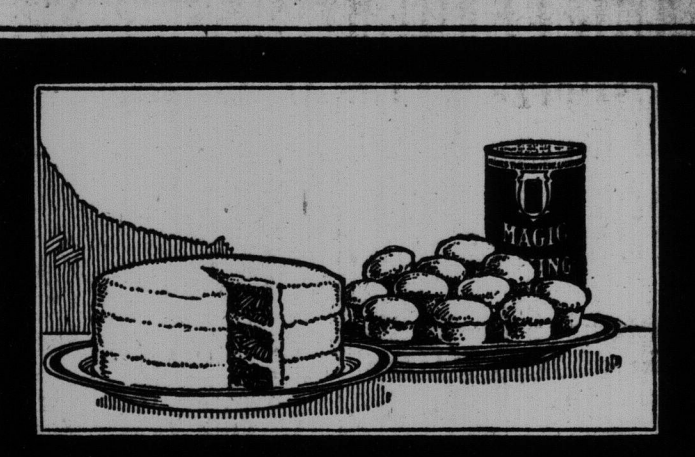
