BOND ISSUES TOPIC AGAIN AT CITY HALL

Question Arises Over Paving Work Planned For Paradise Row

CITY PAYS BILL FOR TROOPS' SERVICES

Bank Assessment Matter In Legislature—Public Works Overdraft

The question of bond issues was discussed again this morning by the Common Council when Commissioner Wigmore asked if it was the intention to pave Paradise Row soon. Commissioner Frink remarked that while he did not like the idea of a bond issue at present, it looked as though this work might have to be carried on. The council decided to pay a bill of \$871 from the militia department for services of troops in 1925, granted the commissioner of public works a \$20,000 overdraft if he should require it this year and referred a request from the C. P. R. for an improved ramp at the Empress dock to the commissioner of harbors for a report.

GENERAL MATTERS. The committee of the whole recommended that permission be granted W. E. Emerson & Sons, Ltd., to install an additional gasoline tank and pump in their premises, Saint John West, that the commissioner of public works be authorized to pool his balances for the year, that the commissioner of water and sewerage be authorized to renew the sewer in Rockland Road and the application of Oland's Brewery for permission to install a gasoline tank and pump be granted and that the reports of the commissioner of public safety, chief of the fire department, and city electrician be printed in the public accounts.

On motion of acting Mayor Frink he and the Chamberlain were authorized to arrange for the printing of the accounts and reports for 1925, after calling for tenders for the work.

BANK TAXES. The acting Mayor reported that, acting in an emergency, he had forwarded to the legislature a bill to amend the city Assessment Act to permit of the collection from the Royal Bank of Canada of taxes claimed by the city to be due from the Union Bank of Canada, the latter having been absorbed by the Royal Bank. His action was confirmed by the council.

PAY MILITIA BILL. Acting Mayor Frink reported that he had an interview with E. A. Schofield in connection with the bill from the Department of National Defence of Canada to the city for \$171 for services rendered in 1925. Mr. Schofield informed him that the bill of \$180.72, which had been paid by the city for the services of the Mounted Police last year after the department felt the need for their services had expired and that the \$171 was for the services of the local militia. He moved the bill of \$171 be paid the department of National Defence from general revenue.

PUBLIC WORKS. Commissioner Frink reported that owing to the severity of the winter his appropriation for street cleaning, mowing and snow removal had been about exhausted and he moved he be authorized to contract an overhauling of \$25,000 should it be necessary in order to carry on. This was seconded by Commissioner Wigmore and carried.

Commissioner Frink said he had been considering this matter and in preparation for the paving of this street curbing had been placed. He was both to ask for a bond issue at the present time, but it might possibly be that the work would have to be done. He had been in communication with the New Brunswick Power Co. to see if one of the trucks on this street might not be taken up and would take this phase of the matter up with them again. The commissioner said he would bring in a report on the paving and Commissioner Wigmore is to bring in a report on the sewerage work necessary.

An invitation to the council from the Carleton branch of the G. W. V. A. to attend divine service tomorrow morning at St. George's church, in honor of "Forest Day" was accepted.

A communication from S. A. M. Skinner, asking if the council would care to secure the Hollis property in Rockland for the cutting of stone for street work on the same terms as they had it before—relief from taxes—was referred to the commissioner of public works for a report.

Commissioner Frink said he planned to start removing the rock in Cranston avenue this year and this would be used in street work.

The Board of School Trustees wrote that they would need \$750 on May 1 to pay expenses in connection with the Vocational School and this was ordered paid.

REEDS POINT WORK. A letter from J. M. Woodman, superintendent of the New Brunswick division of the C. P. R., asking that the city put in a new ramp at the Empress berth, Reed's Point, was read. He asked that the ramp be made 64 feet long and gave the estimated cost as \$5,000. The letter was referred to Commissioner Bullock for a report.
