

COMMONS VOTES OVER COMPOSITION OF C.N. COMMITTEE

Quinn of Halifax Declares
Nova Scotia Has Been
Ignored Again

BOYS ASK FOR ONE
FROM EAST ON BODY

Progressives, Laborites and
Independents Back
Cabinet

OTTAWA, May 19.—A division shortly before the house adjourned at 6 o'clock today gave the Government a majority of 15. This afternoon's division stood:

For.....107
Against.....92

Majority.....15
As in the budget divisions, Progressives, Independents and Labor members voted with the Government. Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen was absent from the division through illness. Premier King did not vote. He announced later that, although he had not been paired for today's division, he had refrained from voting, because continued illness was obviously the cause of Mr. Meighen's absence.

Today's division came on a motion for appointment of a special committee of the House to consider Canadian National Railway estimates. Under the motion, the committee is to consist of six Liberals, six Conservatives, two Progressives and one Labor.

It was against this composition that Conservative opposition was mainly directed. Conservatives wanted a membership of seven Liberals, seven Conservatives and one Progressive.

NOVA SCOTIA IGNORED.

F. P. Quinn (Halifax, Conservative), remarked that "Nova Scotia had been ignored again," and there was no representative from that province on the committee.

The motion was carried in its original form of 6-63.

W. A. Boys, chief Conservative whip, suggested that the unanimous consent of the House be obtained to increase the membership of the committee by one; and that the additional member be appointed from the Nova Scotia Conservatives.

Premier King thought the resolution should pass in its existing form. Whips might hold a conference afterwards and make any recommendations to the House subsequently, which they thought desirable.

2 CONSERVATIVES BOLT.

W. F. MacLean (Conservative, South York), who with H. S. White, the Conservative member for Mount Royal, voted with the government in the House of Commons this afternoon, stated tonight: "I voted for the motion proposed by the minister of railways to appoint a special committee dealing with administration of the Canadian National Railway because the composition thereof had been agreed upon at a conference of whips and members representing the several parties recognized in the House. Speaking for myself, I am anxious to keep politics out of the administration of Canada's greatest public owned service, the National Railways."

FAIR PLAY EXPECTED.

Mr. MacLean added that the people expected parliament to give this great experiment fair play and avoid any suspicion of partisanship.

"If any section of the country was not represented on the committee the House would find a way of curing the injustice," he said. "The committee ought to be speeded towards its work," he added.

Mr. White did not wish to make any comment on his own vote.

"It was a matter of no great consequence," he said.

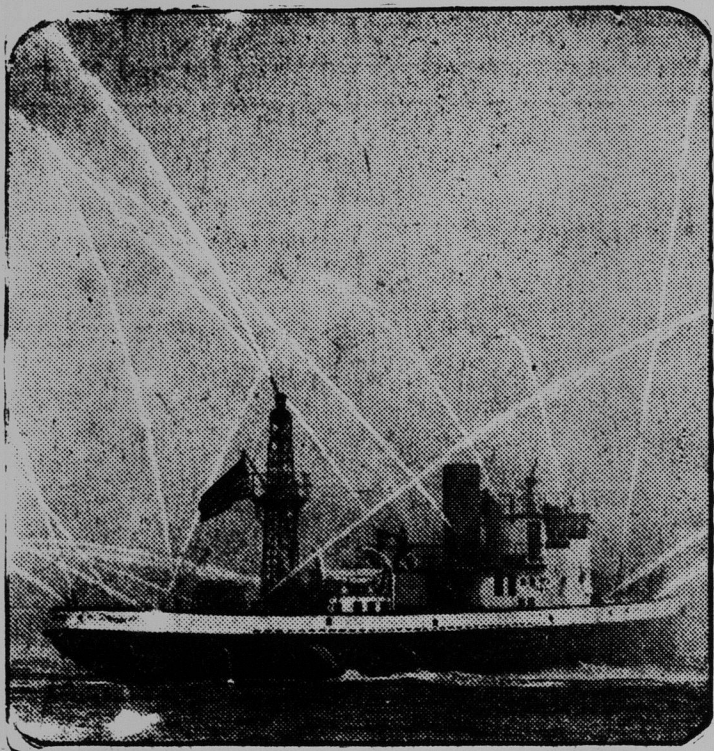

HONORS RECEIVED BY TWO CANADIANS

MEDALS PRESENTED
BY ROYAL SOCIETY

Prof. M'Lennan, of Toronto
'U', and Dr. Roberts, Poet,
Are Recipients

OTTAWA, May 19.—Two prominent Canadian, a scientist and an author, were tonight honored by the Royal Society of Canada, when they were presented with medals emblematic of outstanding achievements in their line of work.

W. A. Parks, of Toronto, president of the association, presented the Flavelle medal to Prof. J. C. M'Lennan, of the University of Toronto, and the Lorne Pierce medal to Dr. Charles G. D. Roberts, author and poet.

Dr. Parks, in presenting the Lorne Pierce medal, gave a resume of the author's achievements and expressed the hope that he would reside in Canada in future. Dr. Roberts was born in Fredericton, N. B., and educated at the University of New Brunswick, but for a number of years had resided in London, England.

His first poems were published at the age of 19 and his efforts had stimulated other authors to continue their literary endeavors. More than 50 volumes of works had come from his pen, inclusive of both poems and fiction.

M'GILL PRIZE IS WON
BY LUNENBURG MAN

MONTREAL, May 19.—H. F. Moseley, of Lunenburg, N. S., has been adjudged prize man in first year medicine at McGill University and has also been awarded the Jackson prize in histology and embryology. It was announced tonight at the university.

The second-year prize man was N. W. McLeod, of Vancouver, B. C. The Jackson prize in first-year medicine, which was awarded this year for the first time, is an annual donation of \$50, founded by Mr. and Mrs. H. F. Slater Jackson, in honor of their son, Dr. F. Slater Jackson who was assistant professor of histology.
