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U. S. Tourists Urged To Show Flag Courtesy

WASHINGTON, June 20.—American tourists were advised by the American Automobile Association not to wave the Stars and Stripes indiscriminately from their cars in Canada. "This practice has caused needless irritation, hurt Canadian sensibilities and resulted in some untoward incidents," the association warned. "Something more than courtesy to a friendly and hospitable people is involved. When you fly your flag in a foreign country you should fly it along with the flag of the nation whose guest you are and under whose protection you are traveling."
