NO HELL, SAYS PREACHER

Mr. Pedley of Toronto Gives His Views on the Subject

Toronto, June 24—"I reject the doctrine of unearned, unrepentant and endless torment, because it is a libel on my God. The word 'Hell' has no right to be in the new testament. Such was the outspoken assertion of Rev. Jas. W. Pedley, in a sermon on "Heaven and Hell" last evening.

Rev. Mr. Pedley did not know what would become of the man who scorned God and gave himself to evil, but he knew there would be certain retribution, but he laughed at the idea of the cooling stove and the flames and the other things some have imagined. He said there was no such thing. The doctrine of eternal torment was absolutely untrue and unscriptural.

THE REPUBLICAN POLITICS

Chicago, June 24—Another climax in the victory of President Taft in the Republican convention was expected to come today with the meeting of the national committee. It was given out as practically certain that Charles D. Hillis, personal secretary to the president, would be selected as chairman of the committee. Members of the committee who are allied with Colonel Roosevelt would, it is believed, resign.

Mr. Hillis, forecasting that this would be the result, busied himself by consideration of men of political power in their homes to fill the places of Roosevelt men. It was said from Roosevelt friends that the representatives of the ex-president would probably attend the session and force the Taft men to take action. The plan discussed by the Roosevelt men was to be present and enter a "silent protest" of the same variety as that presented at the convention.

COMMON COUNCIL

Matters Which Are Being Considered—The Commissioners' Reports

The common council met this afternoon at half past two o'clock for their weekly session. Reports were submitted as follows:

Commissioner of finance and public affairs, recommending:
(1) That the by-law submitted herewith be adopted to amend a law introduced "A law to amend a law introduced 'a law relating to bill boards within the city of St. John' be passed and ordered."

Commissioner of public work, recommending:
(1) That the application of the New Brunswick Telephone Company (Ltd.) to place a conduit under Brunsell street be refused until such time as the company gives assurance to this council that all the wires used by them on the said street be placed in the conduit.

(2) That a public convenience be erected between the North and South Market wharves according to plans and specification submitted by the road engineer, the work to be done by day's labor; estimated cost \$200.

(3) That the commissioner be authorized to purchase a car load of Texaco oil for oiling the streets.

Commissioner of harbors, ferries and public lands, recommending:
That Charles A. Emery be granted license to remove the rock on the west side, bounded by Victoria, Albert and Minette streets and that he pay the city for the privilege at the rate of ten cents a cubic yard.

That tenders be called for recovering the foot path on the north side of North Rodney wharf, as ordered by the common council on May 4 last.

That the suitable timber now being removed by the government from the C. P. R. wharf be utilized in wharves at the Nelson wharf, the cost thereof not to exceed \$800, the work to be done to the satisfaction of the commissioner.

That the application of Frank H. Elliott to operate a fishing weir on the north-east corner of Partridge island and specification submitted by the road engineer, the work to be done by day's labor; estimated cost \$200.

That the by-law herewith submitted be adopted "a law in further amendment of a law introduced 'a law relating to the harbor of the City of St. John, and the wharves and slips within the said city be read a first and second time, and that it be passed and ordered and forwarded to the lieutenant-governor-in-council for confirmation."

Commissioner of water and sewerage, recommending:
That the order of common council of October 3, 1910, to lay a sewer westward in prolongation of Clarendon street, crossing the property of the St. John Railway Company and there connecting with the main sewer which drains Main street, be varied so that the sewer be laid in connection with the main sewer, making in all an estimated cost of \$4,200, and that tenders be called for the same.

That a sewer and water pipe be placed extending from Sidney street main eastwardly along 150 street in connection with the pavilion which is to be erected by private subscription on the public play ground at the Levee boulevard, at estimated cost of \$150.

That tenders be called for renewing the sewer in Main street and laying a sewer in Hazen alley, already ordered by council.

That the Silver Falls pumping station be put in good order at estimated cost of \$1,000.

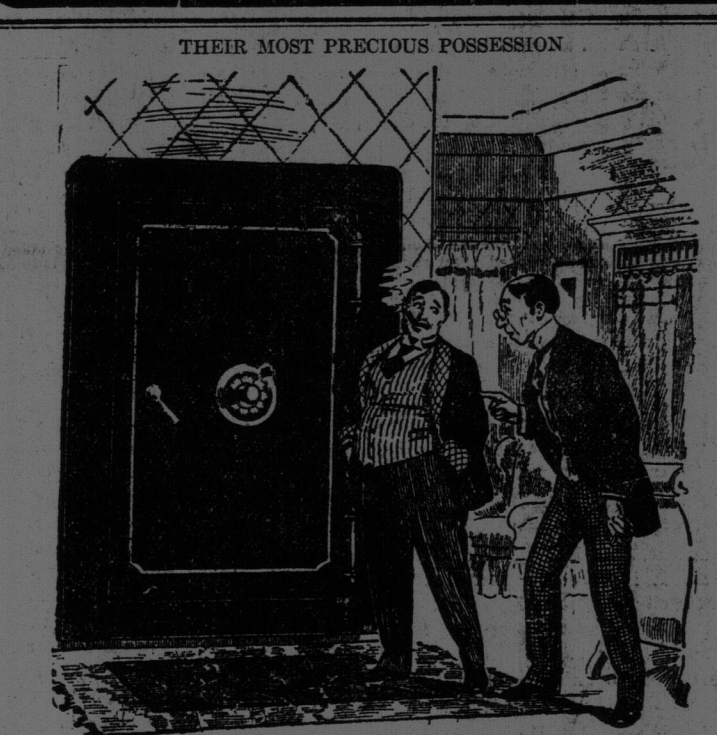

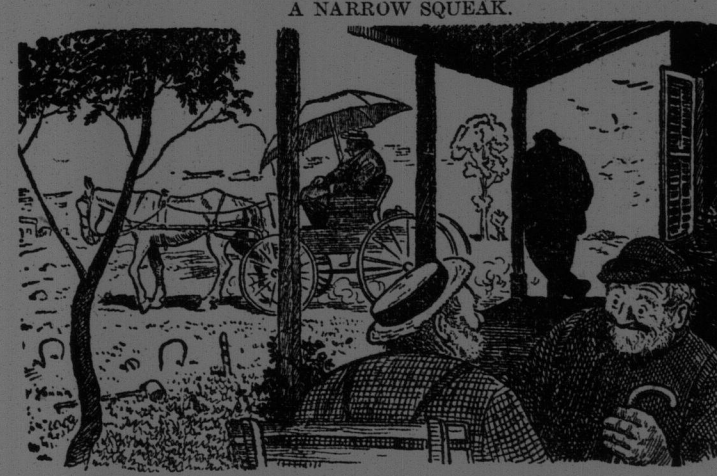
