Since Thursday last the man, who is a native of Finland, and unable to speak the English language, so as to make himself understood, has been placed in custody five times, and on Thursday last his name appeared twice on the police books. He has been arrested every night this week to date, always on the same charge, "wandering about without satisfactorily accounting for himself."


