The program ended with two boxing bouts—three two-minute rounds each—in which the contestants were Burns vs. Gaultier and Lunney vs. Whipple.

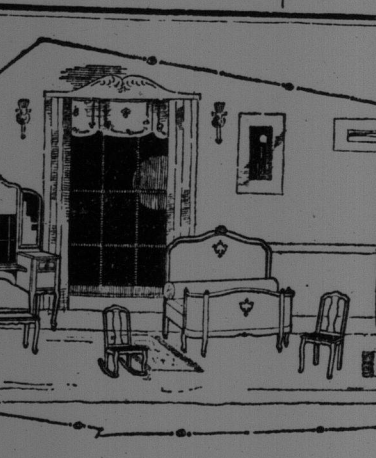
