At the Bank applications continue to increase. No good operations at the Bank on Friday.

The Daily News City article says: Funds showing a dropping tendency, notwithstanding the purchase of Consols by one operator to the extent of a hundred thousand pounds and continued investments by Government. The broker market closed flat.

The increased demand for money in the discount market threatened the introduction of new projects, and a drain of silver to the East excited discussion. Meanwhile the bank returns showed a further increase in the enormous unemployed resources of the Bank. In some other departments of the Stock Exchange heaviness likewise prevailed, but considering the depression of Consols, and the rapidity of the recent rise, the market for British Railway Stocks, though lower in price exhibited good steadiness. A fall in leading Canadian Railway Securities formed a feature of the day.

FRANCE.—A Meeting was held at Paris on the 20th for regularly constituting the Suez Canal Company. It was positively stated that bona fide subscriptions had been obtained for the full amount of the nominal capital.

The Paris Correspondent of the Globe says:—Montalembert has received a letter from Count De Chambord congratulating him on his independent attitude and expressing the sympathy of the head of the Bourbon Dynasty.

The Bourse had been heavy, but subsequently improved, and on the 17th, three percents, closed at 75 to 75.

ITALY.—The Correspondent of the Daily News says, it is not easy to get authentic intelligence from Rome. Cardinal Antonelli having declared war upon Foreign Correspondents, stopped their letters and threatened to turn them out of the City.

A letter from Turin states that the condition of Italy grows every day more serious. The impression is general that a political crisis is at hand. It is from a high source that rumors of a warlike tendency proceed. It is also believed that Piedmont is encouraged by the "Tuleries."

AUSTRIA.—The Vienna correspondent of Times says, notwithstanding the inclement season of the year, men who were on furlough have received order to join their regiments in Venice and Lombardy; and notice has been issued that the military authorities desire to purchase horses for cavalry and artillery, and necessary supplies were also being sent into the fortresses in Italy, so that if an attack should be made on Austria, she will not be taken by surprise.

RUSSIA.—The Prince of Wales returned to England from Berlin, taking with him the order of the Black Eagle, conferred on him by the Prince Regent.

RUSSIA.—The Empress Dowager of Russia was suffering from a severe attack of bronchitis. A powerful party is said to have been informed among the nobility to frustrate the Emperor's emancipation schemes. They have projects diminishing the power of the Emperor and increasing that of the nobility.

CHINA.—The London Times in a leading article, gives interesting details of the progress at Shanghai by Lord Elgin and the Chinese Commissioners. The demeanor of the latter had been such as to confirm the belief that the Court of Peking is resolved to carry out the provisions of the treaty with entire good faith. The progress of the tariff negotiations already promises an early and most satisfactory termination.

There is every reason to believe that the vexed question of the opium trade will be settled upon a basis which shall prevent its becoming a cause of difficulties. It is probable that the expectation of coined copper and re-exportation of rice will be legalized upon equitable terms.

Mr. Reed, the American Minister, was working harmoniously with the British Commissioner upon the tariff question.

MARKETS.—Cotton continues to be wanted—business impeded by scanty supply. Provisions fluctuating, with a downward tendency. Sugar flat—no change in prices. Timber improved slightly—market fairly stocked—dull sale. Coffee advancing. Breadstuffs slow; downward tendency. Consols 97½ to 97½.

It is stated that within the last three years the number of unknown persons who have died in New York, has averaged three hundred per annum. This seems almost incredible. How many tales of sorrow and suffering are connected with these mysterious records.

TERRIBLE LOSS OF LIFE.—Augusta, Ga., Dec. 31.—Forty persons were killed or drowned this morning, by the train from Columbus to Macon running off the track, in consequence of injury thereto by heavy rains.
