

a class, by the Rev. John Saul. In the Spring of 1845, he emigrated to Canada, and settled in the Township of Brock, where his father then resided; and in the fall of 1846, was employed as Assistant Missionary on the Brock Mission, under the superintendence of the Rev. Wm Young. At the following Conference he was received on trial as a candidate for the ministry. From that time until his last illness, he showed himself a faithful labourer in the vineyard of his Lord. On every Circuit where he laboured, God gave him fruit of his ministry in the conversion of souls and the edification of the Church. From the last London Conference he returned to his Circuit with earnest determination to work more heartily than ever, and cherishing the highest hope of success in his loved employ. But God's ways are not as our ways. Early in July, 1865, while pursuing his pastoral work, he caught cold, disease of the lungs ensued, and he was laid aside; hoping, however, soon again to be able to resume his work. This hope was not broken until December, when a consultation of physicians informed him that his disease must very soon prove fatal. Thenceforward he sank rapidly, until he slept in Jesus. During all his affliction, the presence of God, and the precious Gospel he delighted in preaching to others, abundantly sustained and cheered him. He was entirely resigned to the will of his Heavenly Father. His strong, well-balanced mind, remained vigorous to the last; and many expressions of gratitude, resignation, and christian hope, were given by him in presence of those friends who stood around him in his last hours. As a Christian, Bro Campbell's walk comported well with his profession. His preaching was sound in doctrine, and clear and forcible in exposition. As a Methodist, he was an ardent and intelligent lover of Wesleyan discipline and usages. Faithful as a pastor, he "took heed to all the flock over which the Holy Ghost had made him an overseer, to feed the Church of God;" "and when the chief Shepherd shall appear, he shall receive a crown of glory that fadeth not away."

## 2. REV. RUFUS ARLINGTON FLANDERS.

The Rev Rufus Arlington Flanders was born on the 1st of June, 1817. He was blessed with a pious and devoted mother, whose christian fidelity was the means of his conversion to God in 1838, the fruits of which were evinced in his subsequent life and conduct.
