TO RELIEVE WATER FAMINE Remedies Suggested for Existing Lack of Pressure.

Ald. Millidge Suggests Addition of Bustin's Lake to System—Will Cost \$30,000. Frequent complaints are made with reference to the poor supply of water in different parts of the city, but from all that can be learned from the water officials the city can do nothing to remedy this.

It is Ald. Millidge's intention in the present endeavor to bring about the proper enforcement of the present by-laws or to introduce others, if necessary, regarding the water department.

When pipes are laid through any places in which they are exposed to frost he thinks some good covering should be supplied. Then as another improvement the outlets of the faucets might be reduced. If it is only a minute to fill a bucket now, let the faucet be reduced so that two minutes will be required.

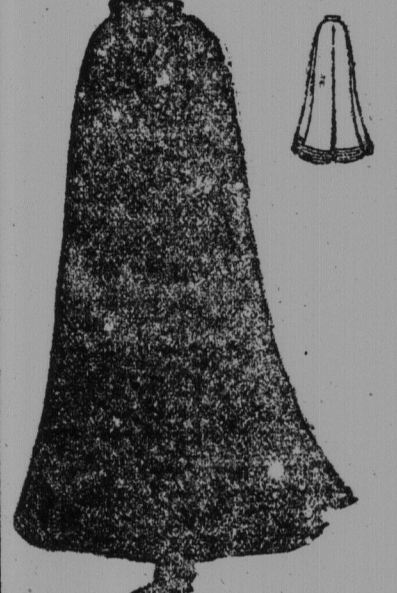
