NOT QUITE SO HEAVY.

More Moderate Report on
Western Crops

Although Much Rain Fell in June, the
Wheat Would Have Done Better
With More Moisture.

WINNIPEG, July 31.—Crop conditions
at the end of July are perhaps not
quite so rosy as many expected them
to be. In spite of all the rain that
fell in June and which made many
people worry for fear that the coun-
try was getting too much, there is a
very general complaint of want of
rain, and this has undoubtedly less-
ened the average yield, to what per-
centage only the thrashing machines
can tell. Careful reading of the re-
ports show that while the harvest
will be much earlier than last year
it will not be a very early harvest,
for although on light land consider-
able wheat will be cut on and about
August 10, there will not be much
general cutting until the week of Au-
gust 15 to 20, which is all the way
from a week to ten days later than
either the year 1906 or 1907. Taking
the country from end to end, however,
conditions are decidedly better for
reaping without damage, an average
crop, so far as yield is concerned, and
much more than an average crop for
quality.

An average crop on the average now
in means at least very considerable
over a hundred million bushels, though
how much over it is difficult to say.
With the harvest about two weeks
away farmers are manifesting great
anxiety over the question of labor
supply. A thousand men could be
placed tomorrow through the Pro-
vincial Immigration department alone,
a fact which indicates a remarkably
large demand for men. It is esti-
mated that at least thirty-six thou-
sand extra hands will be required, nine-
teen thousand of which are wanted

TEN YEAR CONTRACT WITH STREET RAILWAY

Last night at a special meeting the Board of Public Works acting in conjunction with the four aldermen-at-large decided to recommend to the Common Council at next Monday's meeting the acceptance of a ten years' contract with the St. John Railway Company for the maintenance of the streets on which its tracks run and for the removal of snow from the same. The amount to be paid the city by the company is \$1,000 per month. Payments are to be made at the first of each month and the first is to be made as soon as the contract is signed. The board was unanimous for the acceptance of the company's proposal. The only point raised was that \$12,000 a year might not be sufficient for the purposes for which it was intended.

The Board of Works also passed a recommendation to council to the effect that separate account be kept of the moneys paid by the St. John Railway Company. This recommendation was for the purpose of preventing any diversion of these moneys to purposes other than those for which they are intended. In the past such diversions have been made.

A statement of the expenditure of the Department of Public Works was presented to the board. Out of an appropriation of \$71,000 there had been expended \$31,000. It was decided to attempt to readjust the items of appropriation so as to avoid over-expenditure.

LOCATION OF STAND PIPES

The board at its special meeting also considered the matter of the location of the stand-pipes which are to be erected for the purpose of filling the watering carts without using the fire hydrants for the purpose. Ald. Frink, chairman of the Water and Sewerage Board, was asked to look into the matter and report.

Besides the aldermen-at-large and the members of the board, who were all in attendance, there were present at the meeting Superintendent of Streets Winchester, Director Peters and H. M. Hopper, secretary of the St. John Railway Company.

At the beginning of the meeting the chairman, Ald. McGoldrick, informed the board that No. 5 warehouse, concerning which there had been mentioned in the Mayor's inaugural, was fully supplied with hose and had been for some time.
