The band will again be in attendance at the Victoria roller rink this evening. Large numbers are expected to attend. The floor of the rink remains in excellent condition.

Rev. Dr. Flinders of Centenary church was the speaker at the service in the Seamen's Institute last evening. He delivered a stirring address. The monthly meeting of the board of management will be held tomorrow evening at 8 o'clock.

Rev. H. F. Waring of Halifax, a former pastor of the Seamen's Institute church, preached in that church yesterday at both the morning and evening services. Mr. Waring received a cordial reception from those who were formerly ministered.

It is intended to have a local race on Moosepath Park on Labor Day, and some good racing may be expected to be held at D. Love's stable on Wednesday evening, when the local horsemen are to meet and make arrangements for the race.

On next Tuesday evening in St. Philip's church a farewell will be given to the pastor, Rev. Mr. Johnson, who is leaving the city. Mr. Johnson has been pastor of this church for the past four years and has been untiring in his efforts in its behalf. Several prominent citizens will be present and address the congregation.

The Boston express did not arrive until after midnight Saturday and as it passed Eglar's street crossing the locomotive struck a horse owned by James McKinney of Chesley street. One of the animal's legs was cut off by the train and it lay near the railway crossing for some time until Policemen Rankine and Henry put an end to its suffering by shooting it.

St. Mary's guild held a successful garden party on Saturday afternoon on the beautiful grounds of J. W. Foley on the Westmorland road. Like the garden party a few weeks ago, large crowds attended. The St. Mary's band was present and rendered several selections throughout the day. Games of all kinds were played and refreshments were served.

On Saturday morning when the mayor learned that a picture in which the sheath gown figured was to be shown at the Nickel Theatre and that a complaint had been made concerning the same, he immediately telephoned the Nickel's manager and ordered the picture not to be shown. Manager Golding at once complied. In the afternoon public morality was further safeguarded by a formal notice being served through the medium of the mayor's clerk.

LaBarron R. Thompson, travelling passenger agent of the Eastern Steamship Company, was in the city on Saturday and says that the passenger traffic has been very good during the season, and from indications throughout the provinces the Eastern line will carry thousands of persons from this city to Boston during the next few weeks. About every steamer has already been taken on the Calvia Austin for next Saturday night's trip, and to give the public excellent accommodation Mr. Thompson says the management have arranged for the big liner Candon to make a special trip, leaving about a half an hour after the Austin. With these two large passenger steamers leaving within an hour of each other things should be rather lively about Reed's Point next Saturday night.

The shore of Courtenay Bay, from Orange street to Elliott row, is alive with several thousands of dead herring and silver hake. These fish were brought up by the tide on Saturday evening. In places they are nearly one foot deep. Several of the colored residents of the vicinity were busy from early yesterday morning gathering herring and secured enough to last them through the winter. It is supposed that dog fish chased them to the shore. Last year quantities of this kind of fish were washed ashore at Dun's Rocks, near the Municipal Home, while a few years ago a number about \$5.50 is paid for a hoghead of these fish, so a sardine merchant would have reaped a harvest had he secured some of the lot. While many were washed away by yesterday's tide, there still remains a goodly number.

St. John's contingent of marksmen who will shoot in the Dominion Rifle Association's matches, which begin this morning on Rockcliffe range, Ottawa, left for the Dominion capital on the Montreal express Saturday evening. Three men from this city will shoot in the D. R. A. matches. They are Capt. J. S. Frost and Private E. F. Gladwin, 2nd St. John Fusiliers, and N. J. Morrison, captain of the St. John City Rifle Association. Captain Frost did not finally decide to go to Ottawa until Friday. Major O. Wetmore, 74th Regiment, of Clifton, also left for Ottawa on the same train.

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## HALIFAX MAN DEFEATS CHAMPION BOBBY KERR

HALIFAX, Aug. 30.—With the largest crowd which has ever witnessed an athletic meet in Halifax in attendance, the 25th annual games of the Canadian Amateur Athletic Association were held on the Wanderers' grounds Saturday afternoon. As in all championship games the foremost athletes in Canada competed and as the track was in excellent condition no better sport could possibly have been provided for the six thousand people who crowded the grandstand and lined the entire field.

Interest, of course, centred in the Indian, Tom Longboat, and there was great disappointment when he did not run in the mile race against Holmer, but Longboat is not a mile runner. Holmer covered himself with glory, and is now the Canadian champion mile runner, having won his race after one of the best races ever seen on a Canadian track. Archibald, of Toronto, wins the championship medal for all-round athletes.
