



Princeton, N. J., May 20.—Cornell today won the three cornered boat race with Yale and Princeton on Carnegie Lake, finishing the mile and three quarters, 9 minutes and 1 second. Princeton was second and Yale last.

It was the renewal of aquatics between Yale and Cornell, these two institutions having severed rowing relations more than 12 years ago, when Harvard, Yale and Cornell contested at New London. The official time for the race was Cornell 9:1; Princeton 9:10; Yale, 9:45.

WALTER JOHNSON MAKING FORTUNE

Assuming that Walter Johnson's new contract with the Washington American league club calls for \$7,000 per year, and that he is expected to pitch forty games in return for this compensation, it was worth exactly \$1 to him in his first game of the season every time that he hurled the ball at a batsman or tossed it to a base. For each game he pitches he is entitled to wages on a scale of \$175 per working day. And in his opening appearance he pitched 170 balls to batsmen, threw out three runners at first base and tossed a couple of times to hold men on the bag.
