She was born in Ireland in the year 1821, and entered the convent at Georgetown in 1853. This venerable sister had almost completed sixty years as a member of the order, having celebrated her Golden Jubilee in 1903. All her long life she lived in the same convent. Another sister of the deceased was a member of the Visitation Order and died in Covington, Kentucky, some years ago. Her only living relatives are Messrs. James and Daniel Connolly and Mrs. Thos. McGuire and Mrs. John McCurdy, all in St. John, these being her sister's children.

A Stabbing Affray.

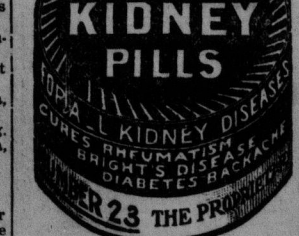
