

CONVENTION IS CONCLUDED

WESTERN M. P. SORRY THAT HE DID NOT STAY IN NOVA SCOTIA

Dr. Clark, Member for Red Deer, Compares Sister Province to the Lowlands of Scotland.

Sydney, N. S., Jan. 3.—"I am sorry I did not stay in Nova Scotia, instead of going west," said Dr. Michael Clark, M. P. for Red Deer, Alberta, in an interview here today. "I believe I could come to Nova Scotia and make as great success of farming here as in Western Canada. Your country is much like the lowlands of Scotland."

The doctor, too, is pleased with the open-hearted way the people of Cape Breton have provided for his hospitality.

"Talk of the hospitality of the highlands of Scotland," he said. "Your people here have it improved on by twenty-five per cent."

Dr. Clark has just come from Antigonish, where, as he himself said, he had addressed one of the most delightful audiences he had ever seen gathered together in Canada. The balcony was filled with beautiful women and the main hall was packed with the men of the place, who though they did not enthrall wildly, listened to the address with strict attention, and I realized that I had a critical audience to talk to. It pleased me greatly and I was convinced that they would weigh the matter carefully."

JERSEY COAST LINE IS STREWN WITH WRECKAGE

On Long Island, as well as on the Jersey Coast, the situation in many places was regarded tonight as critical. Many of the temporary bulkheads erected after the storm on Christmas night have been swept out to sea, and the water is now in places at the mercy of the high waves. At Far Rockaway and Rockaway Beach, many small cottages have been washed out to sea and for a time several of the large summer hotels were in danger.

Hasty reinforcement of their foundations averted great loss. Most of the piers in the vicinity have been destroyed and many boats are lost. Edgewater's entire waterfront is in peril, huge seas washing over the eighteen-foot bulkheads which protect the place. In what is known as the Hammel's section every breakwater has been thrown down and many buildings are in danger of collapse due to a weakening of their foundations by the rushing water.

Main Street Flooded

As had been feared, the rising of the tide after midnight brought ruin to Seabright. The water swept across the railroad tracks in the heart of the town to Ocean avenue, the main street, which was flooded to the depth of two feet, and spread until all parts of the village were inundated. Before the tide had reached the flood stage a current was flowing through the yards and highways from the ocean into the Shrewsbury river, one thousand feet away. Cottages after cottages toppled and fell as the waters undermined their foundations. Some of these were handsome and valuable summer residences.

So alarming was the situation that the town's people generally, an hour after midnight, had boats in their yards ready for use should the water encroach further. At that time the tide seemed still to be rising, but the wind was going down and shifting to the north. This change was welcomed, as it was believed that with the lessened velocity of the gale the danger would be over with the beginning of the ebb.

Steamers Held Up.

New London, Conn., Jan. 4.—Steamers on the Providence, Fall River and other lines, as well as some smaller craft, were forced to seek shelter in the harbor here early this morning as the result of a gale that blew more than fifty miles an hour. The steamer Priscilla, of the Fall River line, from New York to Providence, unloaded here five hundred passengers who made the remainder of the trip by rail. Other steamers that put in were the Tennessee, Georgia and New Hampshire.

Many schooners and barges are in the harbor tonight. A heavy sea is running.

New York, Jan. 4.—Shifting winds late today served to counteract the violence of the seas which had battered at the shores of New Jersey and Southern Long Island for more than thirty-six hours, tearing away long stretches of beach, inundating towns, destroying piers, and hotels, and residences, and causing a property loss estimated tonight to be in excess of half a million dollars. One man dropped dead from excitement at Seabright, N. J., and two are reported missing at Coney Island.

Houses Carried Away.

At the New Jersey towns of Long Port, Margaret City, Ventnor City, Cape May and Atlantic City piers, board walks and cottages were swept away to sea. At Coney Island, Rockaway Beach, and other Long Island points miles of beach were torn out and bungalows, houses and dancing pavilions were undermined.

A theatre at Arvon was destroyed. Between Hammel and Edgemoor many families fled as the waves carried off their cottages. Two men put off in a motor boat from Coney Island yesterday and had not been heard from since tonight. Summer residences at Seagate were damaged by the water.

Shipping Paralyzed.

For the first time in many years water covered the six hundred foot stretch of beach between Great South Bay and the Atlantic ocean, carrying away many cottages near Amityville, Long Island.

HOPE PREMIER OF ONTARIO WILL RECOVER

Rumor of His Death Unfounded—Condition Still Serious, but Physicians Hope for Improvement.

New York, Jan. 4.—Sir James Whitney, the premier of Ontario, is resting quietly tonight at the Hotel Manhattan, where he has been ill for more than two weeks. While it is admitted that his condition is serious, both Dr. R. A. Pyne, the Ontario Minister of Education, and Dr. Herman Biggs, the nerve specialist who is in charge of the case, stated that they apprehend no immediate danger.

Dr. Biggs visited Sir James shortly after five o'clock this afternoon, and after leaving the patient he said that Sir James was no worse, but was resting comfortably.
