## FRENCH SUBMARINE SUNK MAKING DASH THROUGH DARDANELLES

## SUBMARINE SUNK BY FIRE FROM TURKISH FORTS

Made Daring Run Into Straits in Attempt to Sink the Sultan Salim (Formerly the Goeben) - Struck Rocky Shore and Forced to Rise to the Surface — Only Few of Crew Escaped, and Were Made Prisoners.

London, Mar. 19—The loss of a French submarine boat in an attempt to run through the Dardanelles is described by Rear Admiral Guepratte, of the French Dardanelles fleet, in an interview with the Daily Telegraph's Tenedos correspondent. The attempt apparently was made some time ago, although no announcement has been made of it

Sultan Selim (formerly the German cruiser Goeben)," the correspondent says Rear Admiral Guepratt told him. "The submarine was submerged, and successfully navigated the Straits up to the corner where the Asiatic coast juts out at Nagara.

"Through some miscalculation, which is quite natural when a sub-marine is trying to thread a tortuous channel without the aid of a per-iscope, the hull struck the rock shore, compelling the boat to rise to the surface. Immediately the submarine appeared the forts opened fire, sinking her. Only a few of her crew escaped, and these were made
